

How to Live Well Taught at Vassar

Students of All Ages Learn to Get Most Out of Clothes, Cookery and Cottages.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y.—(AP)—Remember how they laughed when the man who studied piano by correspondence sat down to the piano? And how he turned the tables?

They laughed in 1926 when Vassar, nobly assisted by a few people with money, founded an "institute of eugenics."

"What," said many, "is eugenics, anyway?"

Vassar explained that it meant, reduced to its simplest common denominator, "the science and art of living well" and then the skeptics asked how this subject could be taught to an audience of all ages from a few months to the twenties.

The only answer Vassar could give was that it would try. Now, in the closing period of the fifteenth session, it feels it has succeeded. So do hundreds of grown-ups and children who have spent one or more six-week periods on the well trimmed, yet very homey, Vassar campus, learning how to straighten out life's tangles.

It costs \$175 for a parent for the six weeks, and \$150 for each child—everything included. But there are no examinations, and no college credit is given. You only get what you take in your head, if you're lucky enough to be accepted at all. Those in charge try to have as many sections of the country represented as possible. Mrs. Frederick E. Stockwell, the hostess, says, and they do not want the same group back each summer.

Looking on Instructive
The plan is so flexible you experience it best by looking on. It can't be told easily. For example, you are very likely to find a group of women to whom intelligent cookery is a mystery, preparing and serving their own luncheon in one of Vassar's co-operative houses, under the good-humored guidance of Mrs. Laura Leonard.

Mrs. Leonard shows them how little cost has to do with attractive meals, how to buy, when to buy, the advantage of purchases in quantity, and the numerous disadvantages of giving husbands a steady diet of wieners or hamburgers.

Or you may discover a group of women hanging on the wise words of Miss Muriel Cox, who knows the secrets of decorating the female person as well as the interior of houses. She tries to show how it is possible to dress better for less money—one secret is to concentrate on one becoming color, and work around it. One of the worst faults of women's clothes is their passion for prints, she thinks.

Course is Varied
Every summer there is a white elephant sale at the end of the six weeks—you pay 50 cents to enter, and then you swap the clothes Miss Cox has frowned upon for others which may suit you better.

Or grouped around Mrs. Gladys Beckett Jones you can see more women, this time learning about something called "household technology."

It simply means the technique of choosing and running a home, and the chief difficulty, Mrs. Jones says, is lack of money, plus a tendency on the part of married people to withdraw from the departments of home management they do not understand. Too many run a home so they can leave it ready, instead of so they can enjoy it.

You should enter the place to fit you and as nearly as possible your future, Mrs. Jones believes. Right now the tendency in the country at large is toward fewer house-keeping gadgets.
