Economist Thinks "The War is Over"

Deadlock Will Compel Hitler, Britain to Compromise, Dr. Ebersole Declares.

PALO ALTO, Calif., July 19.—(AP)—"The war is over," in my opinion," Dr. J. Franklin Ebersole, of Harvard university, told the Stanford business conference yesterday, "but we will go on arming feverishly for years just the same."

The economist implied a belief that a deadlock in the European battle would force Hitler and Britain to get together and work out a compromise.

"It is the same situation as our foreign debts," he asserted. "They were repudiated five years before we recognized it."

Ebersole told some 200 business executives at the conference that the nation should be thinking of what the world will need when fighting is over and begin working to that end.

Instead, he forecast the country would work furiously on armament, conscript and equip a large fighting force, put capital issues under government control, pour government money into plant construction, adopt consumption controls, restrict imports and set up price-fixing in various forms.

U. S. Must Alter Ideas
E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National Bank of Portland, Ore., told the group America "must change its ideas about our relations to the world. We must become reconciled to the view that we cannot remain on the plane of living to which our politicians have told us we are entitled."

"We have maintained that way of living by hoarding money, managing money, living on our future in a dreamland that will be shattered by the coming explosion."

He said America would "be the most hated of nations because we have so much and refuse to share it."

"We must find that spirit . . . that made us buckle our belts in previous so-called depressions."

The Portland banker said he was little impressed by statements from the national political conventions—"politicians are going through the motions to get votes."

He said this nation must have a greater planning for the future, but that "the great question is how to do this without falling into the morass that Germany and Italy have fallen into."

Loans by Oregon Banks Set Forth

NEW YORK—Fifty-two per cent of Oregon's commercial banks made more than \$25,000 loans totaling \$243,900,000 to business firms and individuals throughout the state during the year 1939, according to the second semi-annual survey of bank lending activity of the American Bankers association made public.

The survey was participated in by 35 banks or 52 per cent of the 72 commercial banks of the state. The 35 banks reported that during 1939 they made:

258,655 new loans totaling \$255,384,627
65,295 renewals of loans totaling \$2,537,162
2,021 mortgage loans totaling \$5,864,188

325,454 \$343,786,217
The survey reveals that business firms in the state are using only about half of the "open lines of credit" maintained for their use on the books of the banks. Six banks in the larger centers of the state reported that they carried on their books during the second half of the year \$37,729,922 in "open lines of credit."

credit" consisting of specific amounts of credit offered to and kept available for established borrowers for use as needed by them. Of this amount \$18,188,684 or 48.2 per cent was actually used.

The average number of new loans made per bank was 6,790 and the average new loan was \$390.

The average number of renewals per bank was 1,721 and the average renewal was for \$1,262.

The average number of mortgage loans per bank was 53 and the average mortgage was for \$2,897.

The Oregon survey was part of a national bank lending activity survey made by the American Bankers association.

For the country as a whole 6,333 or 44 per cent of the commercial banks reported that they made 24,998,000 credit extensions totaling \$39,810,810,000 during the year. These consisted of the following:

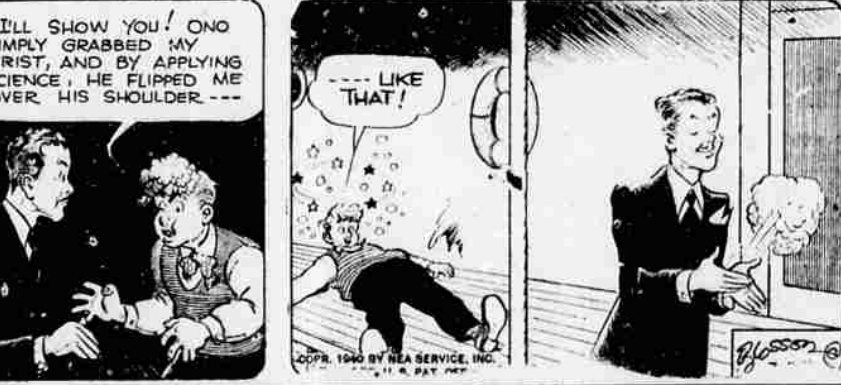
