

Labor Inventory Of U. S. Ordered

Army in Overall for Defense Industries Purpose Of Social Security Board.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—The social security board set out today to marshal an "army in overalls" for the defense industries. Instructions went to all state employment security agencies for a sweeping inventory of the entire country's labor supply and demand situation.

The action was taken after the national defense commission and the security board accepted a series of recommendations made by the board's federal advisory council for employment security. The recommendations dealt with the contributions public employment services could make to the preparation of the plan.

The 4,500 full-and-part-time public employment offices in the country were advised to check immediately with all employers on their present and prospective labor requirements.

Employers are to be requested not to seek labor competitively or outside the immediate locality until the employment offices have had an opportunity to determine if they could not supply the needed workers.

Jobless Listing Urged.

The offices also were told to encourage prompt registration of all jobless employable persons and all skilled workers employed in semi-skilled or unskilled labor. All types and grades of labor are to be requested not to migrate from home communities without first ascertaining the work possibilities there.

The registration of workers would be integrated closely with the public training and retraining courses designed to prepare labor for defense industries.

Job priority and preference would be given to citizens and those with first citizenship papers. No labor shortage has yet been reported in defense industries, but the demand for men is expected to increase as soon as munitions production starts progressing toward peak proportions.

SALEM, July 24.—(AP)—The state employment service today is preparing for a complete inventory of workers who are available for jobs in industries vital to national defense.

Dr. James Whitcomb Brougher, noted Baptist pastor, will be in Roseburg Friday and conduct services Friday, Sunday and Monday at the First Baptist church, according to the Rev. H. P. Sconce, pastor. Dr. Brougher was pastor of the Temple Baptist church in Los Angeles for 16 years. He then

became president of the North Baptist convention and served in that capacity for two years. From 1930 to 1935 he was pastor of the famous Tremont Temple Baptist church of Boston. He is now the associate of his son, Rev. J. Whitcomb Brougher, Jr., of the First Baptist church of Glendale, Calif.

Friday at 7 p. m. he will speak at a men's fellowship supper, where he will give his famous lecture, "Play Ball."

Sunday at 11 a. m. he will speak on the subject, "An Old Love Letter Reviewed—Can Love Be Destroyed?"

Sunday at 8 p. m. he will speak on the topic, "Does God Care? If So, Why Doesn't He Stop the War?"

Monday at 8 p. m. Dr. Brougher will present his lecture, "Will Rogers and The Philosophy of Good Humor."

Dr. Brougher and Will Rogers, famous film actor and humorist, were close personal friends and spent many hours in each other's homes "chick-cracking and entertaining invited guests."

Dr. Brougher and Rogers also had three notable humorous debates that packed the great hall room of the Biltmore hotel to capacity and were among the outstanding events in the history of the Los Angeles Advertising club, under whose auspices they were given.

His lecture on Will Rogers, it is reported, is regarded as one of the most humorous and entertaining he has ever delivered.

No admission will be charged, but a silver offering will be taken.
