U. S. Boosts Air Force of Britain

LONDON, July 24.—(AP)—Lord Beaverbrook, minister for aviation production, declared in a broadcast tonight that the United States will approve a production plan to supply Great Britain with 3,000 planes a month.

He said, moreover, that since his ministry was formed May 14 Britain had purchased 12,115 airplane engines from the United States.

Lord Beaverbrook said Morris Wilson, head of the British aircraft purchasing mission in the United States, just had informed him of American acceptance of the production plan, and that that word came from the Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau.

He added Britain's own aircraft production reached a record production last week, and that the output so far for this month was double that of the same period a year ago.

Nazi Loss Cited
Germany has lost 4,000 to 5,000 planes since the war began, British sources asserted today in support of a claim that Britain gradually is overhauling Germany in the race for control of the skies.

The royal air force is gaining power steadily through more than doubled home production plus increased American deliveries, these sources said, although conceding that German mass production probably has raised the Nazis' numerical strength higher than at the outset of hostilities.

Estimates last September placed the German air force of first line warplanes at 5,000 to 8,000, as compared with Britain's 3,000 to 4,000.

Reuters, British news agency, said well informed London circles figured German production of planes is being maintained "at around about \$1,800 a month" and added:

"That is a figure which Britain may be said today to be rapidly approaching, although she has yet . . . to overhaul it."

Spanish War Vets Of Oregon Elect

NEWPORT, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—Judd Stauffer, Eugene, senior vice-commander, was elected department commander without opposition at the annual Oregon encampment of United Spanish War Veterans yesterday.

Others elected were Frank Pennington, Portland, senior vice-commander; Henry Gates, The Dalles, junior vice-commander; and Rev. E. A. Smith, Portland, former chaplain, inspector.

Charles C. Miers, Portland; John A. French, The Dalles; Hugh McFarland, Eugene, and the new department commander were named delegates to the national encampment at Detroit, Mich.

The veterans of 1898 adopted a resolution urging an adequate defense to enforce the Monroe Doctrine. A second resolution condemned governmental red tape and offered services of members in whatever capacity they can be of use in national defense.

Ira May Jones of Newport was elected president of the auxiliary, succeeding Jane Monroe of Portland.

Other officers included Mamie E. Stauffer, Eugene, senior vice-president; Lulu Hinchey, Salem, patriotic instructor; Elsie McClung, Salem, historian; Josephine Burnett, Eugene, conductor; Belle Lammer, Eugene, assistant conductor; Jessie Nelson, La Grande, guard.

Oregon Faces Bad Forest Fire Threat

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—(UP)—Oregon is facing one of the worst forest fire threats in history because of the extremely dry conditions now, long before autumn rains are expected, state forestry officials said here.

Forest fires have already destroyed 12,814 acres of timber in state stands alone although the normal fire season has not yet arrived.

ried, the forestry office said. The office has no definite report on the losses in national forests but they are known to be high for so early in the summer.

The forestry office is taking all precautions possible, including the intensified education of campers and sportsmen in fire prevention and control of logging operations when danger becomes acute, to prevent a major catastrophe such as the great Tillamook blaze of 1933, the Smith river fire of two years ago or last year's destructive Willamette river blazes.

Caution Imperative
Man causes by far the greatest number of forest fires—272 of the 376 in state forests so far this year—and many of them can be prevented by the closure of forests during periods of extreme hazard, forestry officials said, but only the religious caution of all who enter the forests will prevent all of them.

Of the 272 man-caused fires so far this year, smokers caused 88 of them, failure to put out campfires another 48, 22 were incendiary, slashing and debris burning caused 21 more and logging operations including railroads were responsible for 35 of them.

Naturally caused fires are being successfully combated with new "hitz" units of trained fighters who are rushed to the scene of a blaze before it gains headway. Lightning has caused 104 fires so far this year.
