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Information On Recreation Given By Forest Office

Weather: As this bulletin in written, a light rain is falling over the Umpqua forest. Forecast for the week-end is for overcast skies, with occasional showers. No danger is not as great as it has been, but the public is urged to use every precaution.

Forest Rules: Campfire permits must be secured except in forest camps which are plainly posted with the words "No campfire permit required in this camp." Axe, shovel and water bucket must be carried when camping outside these posted camps. No smoking is permitted while traveling on forest roads or trails. This rule includes the North Umpqua highway above Copeland creek.

Fishing: In the North Umpqua, steelhead fishing is still very good, especially in the Williams creek, Stoughton section. From Idlewild the report is also good. One Glide resident took his limit Thursday just above Rock creek. Trout fishing is fair in the lower river, and some very nice catches have been reported from the upper waters in the Diamond lake district.

At Diamond lake, fishing is improving, especially fly fishing. Most effective flies are chappy, plain hacktail, and caddis. Trolling with trout orna also has been good. Recent rains have settled the dust, and mosquitoes are practically gone.

A Fish Lake in the South Umpqua district, the fishing is receding, but is still reported to be fair. Buckeye lake is better, with limit catches the rule. Stream fishing in this district is only fair.

From Bohemia district, where streams are very low, the report is that the fishing is very poor.

Roads: All roads in the forest are open except the North Umpqua highway above Copeland creek. This section is closed from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m. Monday through Friday, but is always open Saturday and Sunday. Visitors to Fairview (outlet) and there have been approximately 27 so far this season) should drive the Urice creek road both ways. The Sharps creek road is very narrow and steep above Deans Cabin, and is not recommended.
