Plywood Plants Closed by Strike

TACOMA, July 26.—(AP)—Approximately 1,300 plywood and door workers were idle here today with two Tacoma plants struck by a union strike. The strike was called by the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union (AFL), reported.
 Workers at seven other plants—six in Washington and one in Oregon—are considering similar action and will not report for work Monday unless the union's demand for a 73 cent an hour wage increase is met. Earl Hartley, northwest business manager for the union, said.
 Meanwhile, plywood executives were meeting at the Tacoma Industrial conference headquarters. The Peterman Manufacturing company, employing between 700 and 800 men, closed yesterday following a walkout. Approximately 500 employees at the Northwest Door company struck Wednesday.
 Union headquarters reported about 60 employees at the Lyle Plywood company had taken a "recess" this morning to consider similar action.
 Hartley said four other Tacoma plants employing approximately 900 men; two Everett mills with 1,200 employees, and a Coquille, Ore., firm hiring about 400 workers, "will not open Monday morning if negotiations fail to settle the dispute by this week-end."
 The union seeks a minimum hourly wage of 70 cents for common labor. Hartley said employers agreed to a "supplementary wage" of 25 cents per hour until October 31.

 to boats also approached the coast to attack the convoy, the admiral said, but was driven off by two destroyers and two motor torpedo boats.
 The mosquito boats escaped in a smoke screen. But as the destroyers were returning from the attack they twice were subjected

to bombing and as a result were damaged.
 The Berberia, another trawler, scored a direct hit on the bomb racks of one of the bombers, the admiral said, and the plane blew up in the air. Only fragments of a rubber boat and a few pieces of wood were recovered.
 The Fleming was hit amidships and another trawler picked up her survivors. The Berberia also was damaged.

THIRD PARTY IN DIXIE TO BACK WILLKIE LOOMS

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 25.—(AP)—Word circulated among Wendell L. Willkie's associates today that an effort might be made to form a new party to support him in the democratic south. Willkie said he would make "an aggressive campaign" for southern votes.
 Authoritative reports were that Willkie managers were considering the formation of a third party which would permit democrats to retain their party registration and at the same time vote for the republican candidate. "Democratic union party" and "democratic unity party" were titles mentioned as possibilities.
 Willkie's friends here said that one major question was whether state laws would permit voters in a third party to vote for republican electors. That problem now is being studied, it was said.
 At a press conference, Willkie said he would work aggressively for southern votes. He added that he had received many letters from that section pleading support.

 all activities of American traders in north China.
 As a result of Japanese pressure British authorities were reported to have ordered the United States marine radio station at Tientsin closed effective August 26.
 Since the trade restrictions at Tientsin closed on June 26, Japanese have issued no permits to import American goods and Americans said all signs pointed to a freeze-out of American business in north China similar to that which occurred when Japan took over Manchoukuo. These sources said the new restrictions were being enforced in such a manner as to exclude all but officially needed imports, which were being diverted into the hands of Japanese dealers.
 As a result, American exporters are unable to obtain foreign exchange to cover their shipments to the United States.
 Japan will continue fighting the Chinese until "the Chungking government is crushed completely," a spokesman of the Japanese embassy asserted today.
 The new cabinet of Prince Konoye, he added, will not receive the policy of refusing to deal with the government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

OIL AND SCRAP IRON CURB AROUSES JAPAN'S CONCERN

TOKYO, July 25.—(AP)—The Japanese foreign office instructed its ambassador to Washington today to investigate the United States curb on oil and scrap iron exports after a spokesman had described Japanese reaction as likely to be "very great."
 Domei, Japanese news agency, said that while the presidential order requiring licenses for such exports "may be aimed at Germany and Italy," it was evident it also was "intended to curb Japan."
 Suma, foreign office spokesman, said "our reaction will be very great" if the presidential order is tantamount to an embargo against Japan.
 (In Washington President Roosevelt signed an order requiring licenses hereafter for export of oil and scrap metal, Japan being the largest foreign buyer of the latter. The order does not shut off such purchases, but enables the American government to watch them closely and shut them off whenever it is deemed desirable.)
 Look to East Indies
 Informed Japanese quarters expect Japan to attempt to increase purchases of oil in the Netherlands East Indies if an American embargo is put into effect. Negotiations are continuing with the East Indian government on a wide economic program.
