Robt. Bonebrake Passes First Air Cadet Course

ARMY AIR CORPS TRAINING DETACHMENT, Glendale, Calif., July 29.—Capt. Kenneth P. McNaughton, commanding officer of the army air corps training detachment here, today announced that Flying Cadet Robert R. Bonebrake of Roseburg, Oregon, former student at Roseburg high school, has successfully completed primary training as an army pilot and will leave at once for the "West Point of the Air," Randolph field, Texas.

Flying cadets enlisted under the army's current expansion plan spend three months at Grand Central Flying school here in primary training. Those who survive the "weeding out" process then go to Randolph field for three months basic training followed by three months advanced instruction at Kelly field, Texas.

At the end of this nine months' total training, needed, they gain their commissions as second lieutenants and their "wings" as full-fledged army air corps flyers.

Naval Academy Vacancy Open to Oregon Youths

The First Congressional district of Oregon will have one vacancy at the U. S. naval academy at Annapolis, Maryland, in 1941 and Congressman James W. Mott reports in a message received here today he is anxious that all ambitious young men in his district have an opportunity to try for this coveted appointment.

At the request of Congressman Mott the civil service commission

on Saturday, October 5, will hold a preliminary qualifying examination to determine the eligible candidates in the First Oregon district.

Any young unmarried man, not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1, 1941, may compete.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that applicants notify Congressman James W. Mott, 1532 House Office building, Washington, D. C., not later than September 1, 1940, of their desire to participate in the examination.

Here's One Year's Training in Army

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—If you find that "you're in the army now" a few months hence under the yet-to-be-enacted compulsory military training law, the war department says your year of training will be something like this:

First two months—Introduction to army life and basic military instruction.

Next eight months—Specialist training, with the men expected to drop into branches of the service to which they are adapted or preferred; unit training, with emphasis on functions as a combat team.

Next month and a half—Training to develop the practical application of the previous instruction, with field exercises and maneuvers.

Last two weeks—"Deprocessing," which would include assignment to national guard units, for instance, and preparations to return home.

The first debate was on the subject "Resolved that Cowboys have done more for Civilization than Preachers." Dr. Brougner will repeat this discussion and give both sides of the side-splitting discussion.

In addition to this Dr. Brougner introduced Will Rogers on many occasions and will tell of the unusual witty sayings that Rogers pulled off in replying to the introductions. On one occasion Will Rogers introduced Dr. Brougner to a New York theatre audience, along with Jack Dempsey, and for one half hour the great crowd was thrown nearly into hysterics.

It will be remembered that Dr. Brougner was called home from Oregon to conduct the funeral of the noted humorist and comedian. No admission will be charged but a silver offering will be expected.
