

Detroit, Cleveland Still Tied at Top

Both Teams Post Victories in World Series; Cincinnati Nosed Out by N. Y. Giants.

The Cleveland Indians and Detroit Tigers still are deadlocked for the American league lead today, proving that miracles do happen.

They won two of the strangest struggles yesterday that ever went into the records in their desperate efforts to elbow each other off the top rung.

The Indians squeezed past the Boston Red Sox 12-11 in one of the nightmarish. The Tribe was trailing 7-6 when it came to bat in the fourth and even after Keltner hit a home run with the bases loaded Cleveland continued to lag behind until the eighth inning.

Finally Rookie Russ Peters delivered a pinch single with the sacks filled to score the Indians' tying and winning runs.

Detroit had to come from behind four times to beat the New York Yankees 7-6 in 11 innings. The situation didn't get critical until the eighth inning when the Tigers came to bat trailing 4-2. Detroit, undaunted, tied up the score with three singles and finally, in the eleventh with Gomez doing a relief chore for the champion, scored the winning run on two walks and Greenberg's single.

Apple Marketing Pact Voted Down

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—The agricultural department announced yesterday that a federal marketing agreement program for apples produced in Washington state and in all of Oregon except Malheur county, was rejected by producers in a recent referendum and would not be put into effect.

The department said 854 growers voted against the program and 627 for.

The program was designed to regulate interstate shipment of apples produced in the area so as to prevent marketing of price-depressing surpluses.

The department said the necessary vote represented an annual average production of 5,152,488 boxes, while the affirmative vote represented 3,681,911 boxes.

Strongly in favor of the program, the department said, were growers in the Wenatchee district of Washington where 459 favorable ballots representing a production of 2,481,372 boxes were cast compared to 57 negative votes, representing a production of 958,757 boxes.

The heaviest negative vote was cast in the Yakima district of Washington where 439 growers representing a production of 2,207,905 boxes voted against the program, compared with a favorable vote of 151 growers representing a production of 1,107,462 boxes.

In the Oregon district, 317 growers representing a production of 988,188 boxes voted against, while 23 growers representing 98,977 boxes voted for the program.

Aliens Will Face Sharp Questions

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—Aliens probably will be asked 15 questions when they go to post offices to register and be fingerprinted between August 27 and December 27.

An official familiar with the huge task of signing of 2,000,000 non-citizen aliens today that plans virtually had been completed, but that the nature of the questions would not be disclosed for several days.

It was reported, however, that there would be two or three "searching" queries intended to bring out any alien's fundamental attitude toward the United States.

Says U. S. Able to Meet Barter Plan

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—(AP)—American industry can meet totalitarian competition in the world's markets and protect the future of free enterprise if it will begin now to rid itself of "luxury and our unproductive trend toward higher costs," Edgar W. Smith, of the General Motors corporation, told the national foreign trade convention yesterday.

Looking forward to an early end of the European war, Smith warned the United States against committing itself to any system of barter, cartelization or other unproductive economic process in world trade.

When peace comes, he said, "the world once again will be in the market for a bargain—and America's hope and destiny lie in the fact that the free enterprise system has demonstrated its ability over all other systems to provide bargains."

Smith asserted that Germany, in seven years of Nazi regimentation, had "failed completely to show its ability to compete on terms of equal cost and value with the free enterprise industries in America."

President Roosevelt, in a message to the convention, said he had rejected the idea of some persons that the United States already had been defeated in its effort to maintain foreign trade on "liberal and democratic principles."

He said a few "halfhearted defectors" had suggested or implied that the country should abandon its present trade course.

Sir Louis Beale, member of the British purchasing commission, told the conference that "the mistake should not be made of assuming that the war can be won merely by withholding supplies from Germany."

"Now, even more than six months ago, it is certain that direct attack upon Germany will be necessary to bring about her defeat," he declared.

Camden Fire Dead May Reach Seven

CAMDEN, N. J., July 31.—(AP)—Gas fumes sickened fireman after fireman today as they tried to cool still-smoking ruins to search for bodies of missing dead in a fire and explosions that destroyed a million dollar paint plant and at least 67 midtown homes.

Fifteen were treated within a few hours. The fumes, rising from smoldering chemicals, drove all others from the four-block area. Firemen worked in 15-minute relays.

Mrs. Mary W. Kobus, director of public safety, expressed fear the death toll might exceed the number indicated in still incomplete checks. She said insurance underwriters thought "probably seven persons" were dead.

With the picture still far from clear, unofficial reports on the \$2,000,000 disaster—worst in Camden's history—showed:
