"Oregon Sugar Time" to Be Observed This Month

Proclaimed by Governor Charles A. Sprague and by mayors of more than a score of Oregon cities, "Oregon Sugar Time" is to be observed throughout the state between the dates of Aug. 2 and Aug. 17. The special period recently was proclaimed by Roseburg by W. F. Harris, president of the Roseburg city council, acting in the absence of Mayor A. J. Young.

During "Oregon Sugar Time," special emphasis will be placed upon the activities of the Amalgamated Sugar company, operating at Nyssa, Oregon, whose White Satin sugar is rapidly being promoted as one of the state's principal manufactured products.

Stress is being given, the fact that the industry is expected to bring approximately five million dollars of new wealth into the state during the current year.

Edward C. Kelly Named Bonneville Legal Aide

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The Bonneville power administration announced the appointment of Edward C. Kelly, Medford and Portland attorney, as assistant general counsel.

Kelly succeeds William T. Martin, who resigned to enter private law practice in New York. A former state representative, Kelly was graduated from the University of Oregon and practiced law at Medford, in partnership with his father, E. E. Kelly, for a time.

More recently, he served in various legal capacities with the public works administration and as special attorney for the department of justice at Nome, Alaska.
