Majority of Oregon's Dailies Back G. O. P.

PORTLAND, Aug. 6.—(AP)—A survey of Oregon's daily newspapers showed that 14 favor the republican presidential ticket and three are undecided, the Oregonian said today.

McNary included: Astoria-Budget, Medford Mail-Tribune, Baker Democrat-Herald, Astoria Daily Times, Salem Capital-Journal, Eugene Register-Guard, Oregon Statesman at Salem, Oregon City Enterprise, Klamath Falls Herald, Klamath Falls News, Eugene Daily News, The Dalles Chronicle, Bend Bulletin, Corvallis Gazette Times.

Papers undecided included the Pendleton East Oregonian, La Grande Observer and Coos Bay Times.

Portland Wool Auction Doesn't Satisfy Growers

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP)—The west coast's first open competitive wool auction under the Australia-New Zealand plan was held here yesterday, with 26 buyers purchasing 89,000 of the 700,000 pounds offered.

The bids were equal or above Boston market quotations but in most cases did not meet the growers' demands. Sales were about on a par, however, with the recent Rocky Mountain auctions.

A second auction was scheduled today.

Bids on clean basis included: Original range, \$30.00 cents; graded fine, \$1.87; half blood, \$0.84; 2 blood, \$0.79; 1 blood, \$0.75.

Berlin Denies Report of Julius Streicher's Death

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—(AP)—German authorities said today that Julius Streicher was in perfect health on his farm near Nurnberg. They made their statement in comment on a London report that Streicher, governor of Franconia, was dead.

The report was published by Reuters, British news agency, in a dispatch dated "the German frontier." Reuters attributed its information to a well-informed source in Germany.

Streicher, it became known, was released some time ago of his duties as gauleiter (nazi party district leader) for Franconia.

Committee Appointed to Name Willamette Head

SALEM, Aug. 6.—(AP)—A nine-man committee will name a successor to Dr. Bruce R. Baxter, who gave up the presidency of Willamette university to become Methodist bishop of the Portland area.

The committee asked the bishop to continue as temporary head of the school until a new president has been selected. The committee included Amadeo M. Smith, chairman, Governor Sprague, Dr. Guy Goodsell, Portland, Dr. J. C. Harrison, Salem, Judge James W. Crawford, Portland, A. Schramm, Corvallis, Dr. Chester F. Luther, acting dean of Willamette university, C. L. Starr, Portland, Paul B. Wallace, chairman of the university board of trustees.

Oregon Hop Harvest to Employ Nearly 25,000

PORTLAND, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Oregon hop harvest, employing between 20,000 and 25,000 seasonal workers, will begin about August 15 and continue approximately three weeks.

The farm security administration will move one of its mobile camps from the Gresham district hop pickers' families. Larger to independence to accommodate camps maintain their own facilities.

The central registration office at Independence reported wages would be \$1.50 a hundred, an increase of 25 cents since last year. Oregon production was estimated at about 85,000 bales.

Jewish Population of Polish City to Migrate

KRAKOW, German-Occupied Poland, Aug. 6.—(AP)—This city's entire Jewish population of about 40,000 is scheduled to begin a mass eastward migration within "a few days," DNB, official German news agency, reported today.

The "emigrants" will be allowed to take all their belongings with them, the newspaper said.
