

Gobblers' Lead Cut to 2 Games

Game Lost to Butchers in 7th Inning Runfest; Dunham's Conquer Elks, 7 to 3.

The Oakland Gobblers had their lead in the city softball league cut to two games last night when they were beaten 12 to 8 by Roseburg's Butchers at Pinsky field. In the opener last night the Elks club again was forced to forfeit a game because of not having a full team present, but with the aid of several pickup players put on an exhibition game with the Dunham Transformen, the latter team winning 7 to 3.

The Dunhamites tallied three runs in the first inning without the aid of a hit, two walks, three errors and a fielder's choice paving the way for the tallies. The lead was stretched to 5 to 0 in the second inning as the result of a walk, error and hit.

The Elks, however, began to click in the fourth inning when Byrd doubled and scored on an error.

Dunham's added two more to the lead of the sixth on two errors, single and an infield out.

The Elks staged a seventh inning rally, but the effort was halted after two runs had crossed the plate. The game was marred by an accident to Fred Schermer, who suffered a sprained ankle.

Kenny Laurance, hurling for the Transformen, held the lodgemen to four hits, while getting four strikeouts and issuing two walks. Elks gave up four hits and walked three.

Gobblers Crash in 7th

The second game started out as another victory for the league-leading Gobblers, as they jumped into a 5 to 0 lead in the second inning.

The Butchers, however, kept pecking away at the offering by Jacobs and in the fifth inning moved out in front 6 to 5. Oakland, however, came back in the last of the sixth to tally three runs and take the lead 8 to 6. Worthen was sent in to relieve Jacobs on the mound for Oakland, and the Butchers promptly proceeded to carve themselves a victory by chasing seven runs across the plate.

Three of the Butchers divided top batting honors, Morgan, Merritt and Meyers each polling out two hits in four trips to the plate. Meyers had the longest hit of the evening, a long, line-drive into left center field for four bases. Creason also hit a homer for the Butchers. Krawson singled twice in three trips to the plate to lead the Gobblers in the hitting department.

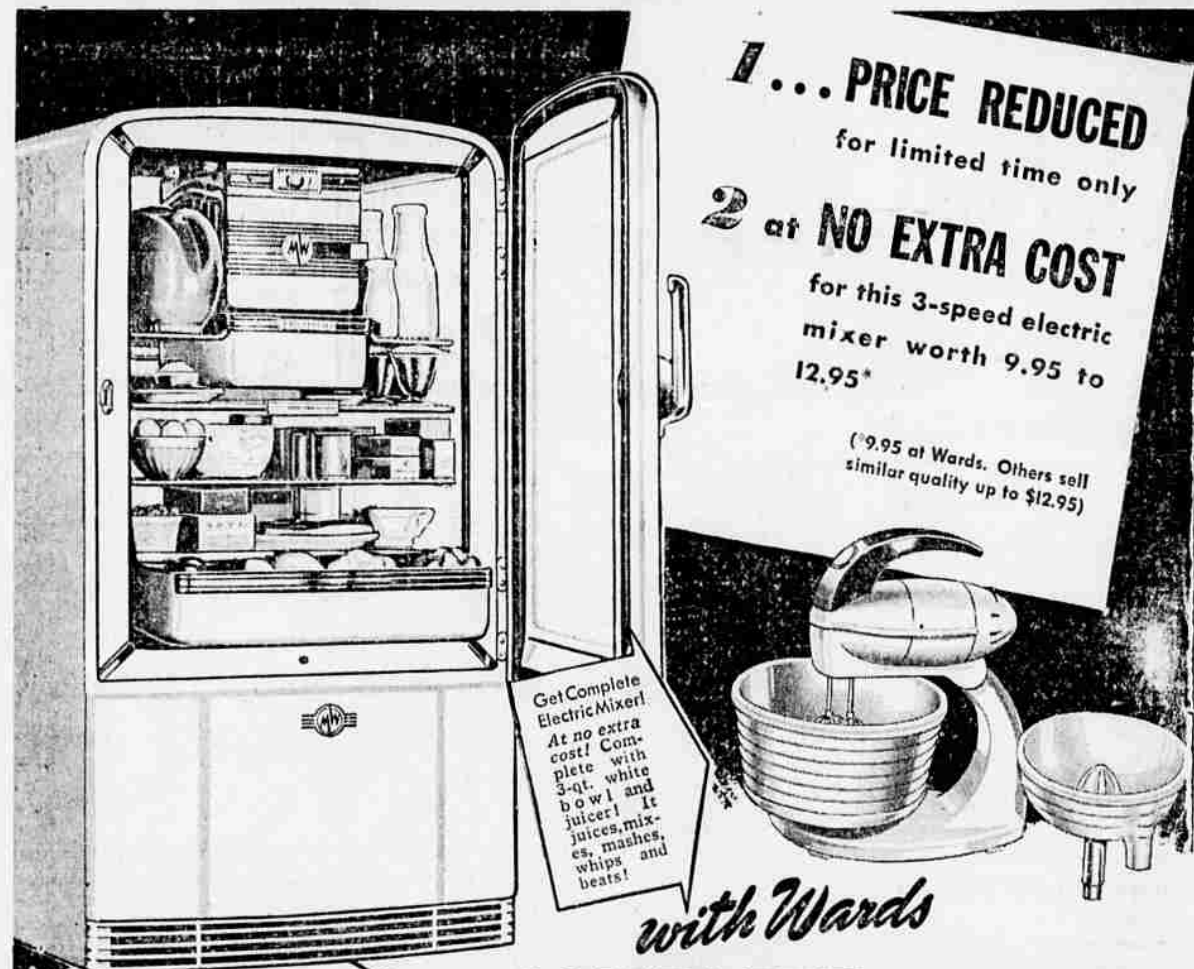
