'Beverage Board' Offered By W.C.T.U. Crusader

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The woman's Christian Temperance Union introduced the "beverage board" today as a handy gadget for the nation's drinkers of non-alcoholic liquids.

It's simply a board covered with gaily-colored oilcloth and set on legs, with an oilcloth "hoop skirt" hiding the ice bucket and jug of fruit or berry juices. Its equipment of glasses, cups, straws, napkins and pitchers should be in matching colors.

Mrs. Blanche Pennington of Huntington, Pa., director of the W. C. T. U. non-alcoholic fruit products department, said the contrivance shouldn't be mistaken for a portable cocktail bar.

"No, indeed," she said, "it is not a bar; it must not be called a bar. It is a beverage board."

It is another of the novelties in non-alcoholic drinking advocated by Mrs. Pennington's department which has issued a series of pamphlets giving recipes for thirst-quenching, vari-colored drinks that have not the slightest tinge of alcohol.
