The affair is being promoted by present students, but O.S.C. parents, alumni, friends and prospective students are all invited for this "all-Orange" day.

New Furnace Arrives For Bonanza Mine

SUTHERLIN, Aug. 17.—A large mine furnace, weighing 75,000 pounds and occupying two flat cars arrived Wednesday from San Francisco. The equipment will be installed at the Bonanza mine east of Sutherlin and will increase production of quick silver approximately one third. The Bonanza mine is now the largest producer of this metal in the United States, and due to the many uses of quick silver in production of armaments this local industry plays a vital part in the national defense program.

Negro Killer Of Woman Gets Life

BEND, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Melvin Jack Williams, 45, Louisville, Ky., negro, pleaded guilty today to the second degree murder of Mrs. Jim Vasellu, 52, and was sentenced to life imprisonment by Circuit Judge Duffy.

District Attorney Boylan said he dropped the first degree murder charge because Mr. and Mrs. Vasellu twice passed within six feet of the negro's hiding place in the central Oregon brush. If the slaying was premeditated, the attorney asserted, Williams could have killed both. Instead, he held fire until the hideout was discovered.

Williams, who waited grand jury investigation and indictment, told officers the gun accidentally discharged in a struggle with Mrs. Vasellu last Saturday. He asserted Vasellu paid him off at the ranch near Bend Saturday but refused to give him his clothes. The Vasellus, officers related, were ambushed later and Mrs. Vasellu slain as Vasellu wounded in the leg with a shotgun.

WORLD WAR VET LEARNS IT'S VERY SMALL WORLD

HOUSTON, Tex.—(AP)—L. E. Parchman, telephone company district plant chief, was a top sergeant of the 412th battalion during the world war, stringing telephone wire up to the front lines.

In the fall of 1918 the battalion ran short of wire and while waiting for a shipment, Parchman left the front for a vacation. Before he returned the armistice was signed.

When the army started its maneuvers early this summer, Parchman was called for the job of wire stringing. Opening up a shipment at Jasper, Tex., he found an invoice dated Oct. 30, 1918, covering wire consigned to the A. E. F.—the wire he needed 22 years ago in France.
