

Mock War Costs Lives of Six Men

YELM, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Pacific northwest's biggest war game, participated in by 4,000 regular and national guard troops ended Saturday with each side a moral victor.

The troops returned to their camps yesterday after the war game umpires declared both "red" and "blue" armies had accomplished the purpose for which they went into the field. The "reds" advanced the "blue" advance but the "blues" had completed their assigned job of taking over disputed territory.

Six fatalities were listed during the extensive maneuvers. One officer died of a heart attack, four soldiers were killed in traffic accidents and one civilian death was blamed on the army maneuvers.

Thurston County Coroner Lynch called an inquest for tomorrow into the death of C. L. Clark, a railroad brakeman who was hurled into the top of a train by a wire strung across the track. Lynch termed the stringing of the wire "sheer stupidity."

Raymond C. R. Clark of Beantownville, Ark., member of the ninth corps headquarters company from the presidio of San Francisco, was killed and four other persons injured Saturday when two motor vehicles and a Northern Pacific passenger train collided at Centralia.

Robert R. Drager, a Fort Lewis soldier, was killed Saturday when a fire truck on which he was riding failed to make a curve and crashed into a warehouse at the fort.

The guardians will continue small unit drills and maneuvers this week before returning home.

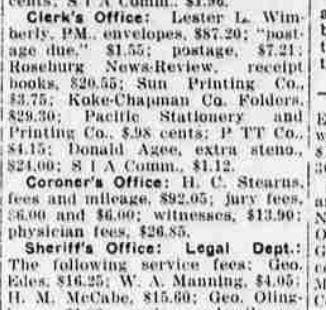
