

Tour of Southern Oregon Mines Set

A field trip has been planned for Labor Day weekend by the Oregon section of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers. All members of the Institute and other persons interested in mining are invited to accompany the group, which will meet at Sutherlin at 1 p. m. Saturday, August 24. The group will discuss the Benton mine, 1.1 miles from Sutherlin, where they will examine the mine and furnace plant. A dinner and technical meeting will be held at the Umpqua hotel in Roseburg Saturday evening. Albert Burch will discuss the Benton mine, F. I. Bristol the non-metallics of southern Oregon and H. C. Willnot the Bonanza mine.

Sunday, the party will leave Roseburg and travel to the Benton mine in the Mt. Reuben district, where they will examine the mine and cyanide plant. From the Benton mine, the group will travel to Grants Pass for dinner and a meeting of the Oregon Mining association. Talks on technical matters will be made following this meeting.

Monday those interested in placer mining will visit several of the dredges that are operating in the vicinity of Grants Pass; while others will travel to Crater lake, where Dr. Warren D. Smith will explain the geology of the lake and surrounding country.

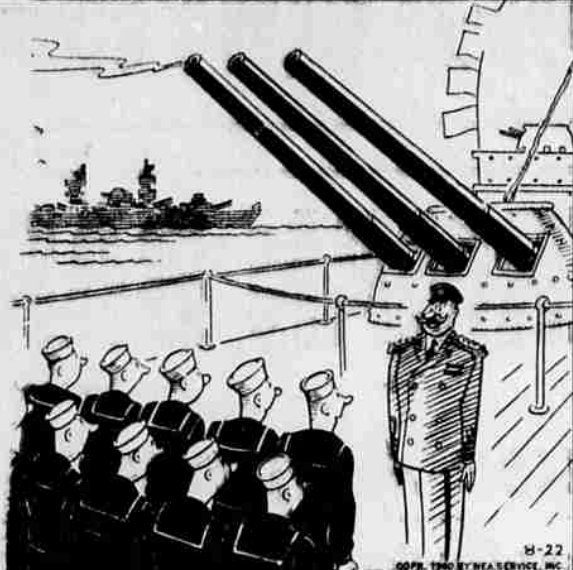

A mountain and valley comprise 50 miles long and 40 miles across, in which production of high-value, low-bulk commodities occupies most of its 18,000 population, represents the southern Oregon county of Josephine.

Threaded through the hills in an endless chain, nine major valleys not only shelter and support the Josephine county population, but also furnish the only routes of travel and trade into and through this forest empire.

This inter-connected system of fruitful valleys through the gold-producing hills forms the Grants Pass trade unit of dairies, mines, orchards, lumber mills, hop farms, bulb and seed acreages, ladino clover pastures and specialty crops.

The Pacific Coast's great tourist trade, converging upon its most important intersection, the Pacific Redwood highway junction, plus the great diversity of a region that sees gold mines running in seasons when sawmills are inactive, and dairies and farms yielding their products the year around, creates in Grants Pass a trade area that never lets down. A population has gathered here from the northwest and midwest and particularly from southern California that knows no depressions and that makes gains year by year and season by season.

In its center Grants Pass is a city surrounded by a city. The inner city, covering about three square miles, houses more than 5,000 people. The outer city, covering 10 to 15 square miles, comprises the Grants Pass irrigation district and is closely built up with residences on 10 and 20-acre farm tracts and its 5,000 population receives such city services as electric power, telephones, mercantile and daily newspaper deliveries.

The population of the city, the irrigation district and the outside eight valleys is reached by the Grants Pass Daily Courier and radio KUN.

The products of this empire are high-value, low-bulk commodities: metallic gold; high-quality shop lumber; ladino clover seed; gladiolus and narcissus bulbs; prime turkeys; cream, butter and cheese; baked hops; table pears and grapes; pure-bred cattle; canned or frozen vegetables to name the best known.

And the people who produce and market them represent the best classes of well-informed, cooperative, 100 per cent literate American citizenry.

Oklahoma Rounds Up Batch of Reds

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 21.—(AP)—An Oklahoma law inspired by a world war anti-draft rebellion was resurrected today for use against 12 persons accused of conspiracy to overthrow the United States government.

The defendants, rounded up by county officers after a broad inquiry into fifth column activity, were held under \$50,000 bond each after pleading innocent at arraignments in justice of the peace court.

Assistant County Attorney John Eberle, leader of the inquiry, asserted that communists had redoubled their activities here and had imported many workers who had "a lot of money to spend."

Oklahoma's criminal syndicalism law, passed in 1919, two years after an uprising against the draft, formed the basis for charges against the defendants. It outlaws the advocacy of revolution.

Under this statute, six of the 12 persons were accused of circulating literature advocating "criminal syndicalism, sabotage, acts of physical violence and destruction of property" to bring about revolution.

Named on this charge were State

Secretary Robert Wood of the communist party; Alan Shaw, Oklahoma City communist secretary; Mrs. Ina Wood, Eli Jaffee, Elizabeth Green and Fred Maxham. Maxham has not been arrested.

The other defendants were accused of being members of the communist party, a society "which teaches, advocates and suggests the doctrine of criminal syndicalism" to accomplish revolution.
