Base Leasing Plans of U. S. Agitate Italians

transform the whole Caribbean sea into a big naval base for the North American fleet.

Stefani said South American circles believe that if Washington should realize this program, the independence of Colombia and Venezuela would be gravely lessened. The agency added that "this prospect is viewed with little enthusiasm in Brazil."

Stefani said proposed concession of air and naval bases by Britain to the United States was viewed as "prelude to an historical evolution in which the first chapter was London's domination over the thirteen colonies of North America," and the last chapter might be represented by England's entrance as a dominion in an imperial commonwealth of the United States.

Blows Dealt Britain—The sinking of a British submarine in the eastern Mediterranean, torpedoing of a British destroyer and air attacks on a squadron of British cruisers in which two were reported damaged were announced by the Italian high command today.

Aid raiders who bombed Gibraltar early yesterday were identified as Italian in today's communiqué. It said one of the attacking planes was lost.

The sinking of the British submarine was credited to an Italian torpedo boat, while an Italian submarine was said to have torpedoed the British destroyer.

Roosevelt Selects Board TO DEAL WITH CANADA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt conferred on his high advisers today, but what they decided was kept private.

Stephen T. Early, White House press secretary, told newsmen there was "nothing new" on the British proposal to lease some of their possessions in this hemisphere to the United States for use as naval and air bases.

President Roosevelt, returning to the capital from New York where he reached a broad defense agreement with Canadian Prime Minister MacKenzie King, said he hoped to make public today the names of the American members of the strategy board and set them to work immediately on plans for improving defense.

At the capital, however, Senator LaFollette (Frog, Wis.) demanded that the public be informed of current negotiations with the British empire. His demand followed unofficial reports from London that Britain might seek a military alliance with the United States.

LaFollette told reporters that he recognized the necessity of secrecy in negotiations such as those in progress with Canada, but he thought that any plans for military commitments should be revealed.

C. W. Kirk Passes Away Here at 85

C. W. Kirk, 85, resident of Douglas county for the past 55 years, died today at Mercy hospital following a major operation. Born in Virginia, he came to Roseburg with his family more than 50 years ago and engaged in farming. He served for a number of years on the Roseburg police force, and later was engaged as a grocer until his retirement several years ago.

Mr. Kirk was an active member of the Presbyterian church.

Surviving are his wife, two sons and a daughter.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Funeral arrangements have not been made.
