Mrs. Childs, who came to Roseburg in the early 1890's as a bride, was one of the most prominent civic workers to ever live in this city. She was the first woman to organize a woman's club in this city and in 1895 founded the Roseburg Mental Culture club, of which she was its first president. Mrs. Childs very graciously entertained the guests by telling them of the founding of this club, which in those days met in the homes of the members. She had two very interesting programs of the club and told numerous delightful accounts of the club activities and its members. The club later became known as the Roseburg Woman's club.

Brown, Roseburg Woman's club president, Mrs. Mark L. Underwood and Mrs. L.
