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Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting
of it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of democ-
ratic government.

YESTERDAY, with an unusually
well-planned and well staged
ceremony on the spacious state fair
grounds at Salem, our Senator
Charles L. McNary was formally
notified of his nomination for the
office of vice-president of the
United States by the republican
party.

Douglas county people were
there in numbers—no accurate
count was possible but 200 would
be a reasonable estimate. The
Roseburg Municipal band was
there and more than did its part in
adding to the day's festivities.

It was a great day for Salem
and, to the eternal credit of that
fine city, the crowds were handled
efficiently and without undue con-
fusion.

In his acceptance speech Senator
McNary courteously ripped large
and gaping holes in the new deal.
Here are some short quotes:

"The new deal has sought... to
inculcate reliance on the govern-
ment in place of self-reliance and
to supplant hope with fear."

"The new deal, which, in seven
years, has failed to map out a
long-range plan for reconstituting
the agricultural empire, piles con-
fusion upon confusion by following
two contradictory policies at once.
With one hand, the new deal pays
farmers not to sow and reap; with
the other, it lowers tariff barriers
so that foreign crops undersell our
own in our market."

"The farmers do not wish to re-
ly perpetually on subsidies which
stop short of economic justice."

"Farm recovery may well be part
of a greater whole. The recovery of
our whole economy hinges to some
degree upon removal of such ob-
stacles to easy commerce as ad-
verse government policies, restric-
tive laws, burdensome taxation and
the uncertainties arising from
pyramiding debt. The overall solu-
tion may only await the installation
of an administration which whole-
heartedly wishes again to see the
United States a going concern."

The above quotations are
selected because they touch upon
the farm problem. This is a farm-
ing county and it is in the im-
provement of the lot of the farmer
that we here in Douglas county are
most interested. It is a fact, as
Senator McNary so ably pointed
out, that when farmers are pros-
perous the whole country is pros-
perous.

Yesterday was a great day for
the anti-new deal forces in another
Pacific coast state. California vot-
ers, in their primary elections,
nominated Senator Hiram Johnson
in all three party elections—re-
publican, democrat and progres-
sive. This vote is equivalent to
election. The significance of the
Johnson victory lies in the fact that
he was opposed by the new deal—
is aligned with the anti-new deal
forces in the current campaign.
The inference therefore is that the
state of California may possibly be
counted in the William McNary col-
umn this coming November.
