Douglas Health Unit Rates High

Advance of Eleven Pct. in 1939
 Score Over 1938 Recorded;
 County Work Commended.

The Douglas county public health unit stood 8th in the entire western division in the national health conservation ratings, according to a report received by Dr. A. N. Johnson, county health officer. The unit's 1939 activities were listed with the American Public Health association at New York for annual rating, and the report shows an advance of more than 11 per cent in 1939 over the 1938 score. In 1938 the unit scored 599 in the national ratings and in 1939 advanced to 664 points and was highly commended.

An oversight in preparing the report to the national association, cut the local unit out of several additional points and perhaps a higher standing in the western division would have been obtained, except for the error. Dr. Johnson reports. One of the items upon which the unit is graded is that of "excreta disposal, for which 50 points is allowed. In preparing the report the fact that a sewage disposal plant is under construction in Roseburg was not included. Had this information been made a part of the report, the unit would have been credited with considerably more than the 18 points allowed out of a possible 50.

Douglas Work Praised
 The unit particularly was commended for appointment of a full-time health officer, for an auditor given to 2,508 students, dental, puppet show and follow-up, crippled children's clinic, survey of handicapped children, sanitary toilet installations, typhoid immunization, x-ray examinations and malaria control.

The suggestion was made that the public health committee should meet at least quarterly and should confer at frequent intervals with the county health officer with regard to the public health program.

The Douglas county unit was rated particularly high in the following departments: tuberculosis control, maternal hygiene, infant hygiene, preschool hygiene, school hygiene, laboratory service, water supply, milk supply, life loss statistics and health education.

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Yankees Win Ten Of Last 11 Games

Champions Making Great Rally
 For Another Flag; Cincy Boosts Lead in National.

There is something catching about the New York Yankees' spirit. They've already captured fans' imagination with a magnificent drive that has bagged 13 victories in their last 11 games, and they're likely to catch the Cleveland Indians and the Detroit Tigers, if the latter clubs don't watch out.

The Yankees polished off the St. Louis Browns, 10-3 and 6-5, in a doubleheader yesterday to show once more why they've been world champions four years, and may be for a fifth.

The victory reduced the idle Indians' margin over them to 11 games. Tigers Also Win.

It didn't get them any closer to second place, however, because the Tigers were busy in their own behalf, mowing down the Washington Senators in a doubleheader, 3-2, and 6-0, to advance within two games of the lead.

Schoolboy Rowe, nearly as good a batsman as he is a pitcher, doubled the deciding run across in the first game for his 12th victory. Newcomer notched his 17th in the nightcap, abbreviated to six innings by darkness. Greenberg helped out with a homer in each game, bringing his season total to 26.

In the only other American league game, the Boston Red Sox were handed a 4-3 decision by R. Nye, who walked Cronin with the bases loaded in the ninth.

Cincy Stretches Lead.
 The National league bunting has been more or less generally accorded to the Cincinnati Reds for some time, but two-fold developments yesterday came close to clinching it.

First, Lavagetto, star third baseman of the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers, underwent an appendectomy, and second, the Reds added the Dodgers, 9-3, in a rain-drenched game. The Dodgers were helpless before the seven-hit hurling of Derringer, bagging his 17th victory, and a 12-hit assault on five pitchers. This boosted the Reds 8½ games in front.

After the game the champs announced the recall of Johnny Vander Meer, effective Saturday.

The St. Louis Cardinals obtained exclusive possession of third place by shutting out the New York Giants, 5-0, with McGee pitching two-hit ball.

The Pittsburgh Pirates extended their winning string to eight straight by shutting out the Philadelphia, 4-0.

Possel shanghaied the Chicago Cubs with five-hit pitching to give the Boston Bees a 3-1 triumph.

Padres Post Third Win Over Seattle
 (By the Associated Press)

The Padres of San Diego proudly pointed today to a record of three victories in three games over the Seattle Rainiers, masters of Pacific coast league baseball.

Pounding the coast's best pitchers on successive evenings, the Padres last night shelled Wilkie from the mound to win 5 to 1.

The day before it was Barrett, who leads the league with 22 won, who succumbed 6 to 1.

Aside from the useful knowledge that these San Diegans would be in their hair for two straight weeks, the Rainiers had little need to worry, for they kept their 15-game lead in the pennant quest, with less than three weeks to go.

The nearest contender, Los Angeles, lost a shutout to third place Oakland, 4 to 0. Corbett gave five safeties in getting his 16th win and Oakland's first in three games against the Angels.

San Francisco nearly scuttled Hollywood's hopes of a first-division berth by downing the Stars 3 to 2, although outlast 10 to 6.

Osborne, Star twirler, gave the Seals one run with a wild pitch and Seal Outfielder Barrett brought in the other two with a homer.

Sacramento made it two out of three from the lowly Portland Beavers by a 5 to 1 score. Judd, the winning pitcher, batted out two doubles to aid the Senators so far luckless drive to displace San Diego for a crack at the president's cup playoffs.

Army, Navy Ban on Japanese Rapped
 PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Regulations making it difficult for American citizens of Japanese ancestry to enter the army and navy were protested today by Saburo Kido, San Francisco attorney.

"We want to fulfill our duties and responsibilities as American citizens by participating in the defense of our country, but we are not always permitted to do so," Kido said at the national convention of the Japanese-American citizens' league here.

"Japanese applicants for service in the naval reserve have been turned down in California and a rule requiring a height of 5 feet, 4 inches keeps away many Japanese from entering the army."

Kido said the league often was caught in the cross-fire between white citizens and first-generation Japanese, ineligible for citizenship.

"We have been criticized by some persons for attempting to protect what we think are the rights of Japanese fishermen operating from the California coast," he added, "We don't like to see any law-abiding group discriminated against and, in addition, these people are our parents and our own welfare is affected if their livelihood is interfered with."

"On the other hand, these same first-generation Japanese criticize us because we don't try to present a case of Japan's activities in the Orient. Our answer is that we are Americans and to defend Japan is not our job."
