

## March of Yankees Halted by Tigers

Gordon's Wild Throw Costly For His Team; Cleveland Downs Boston Sox.

It's too early to say the New York Yankees are stopped. They are what is known as "slow to a standstill."

When the western clubs were in the east the world champions acquired a case of pennant fever by winning 10 out of 11 from the invaders and they got the idea they could do the same thing against the same clubs away from home.

Now they are finding out that the Detroit Tigers and Cleveland Indians, who have alternated this pace most of the season, are stubborn about letting a Johnny-come-lately get into their private feud. And most anything is likely to happen—except the Yankees getting into first place this week.

After splitting a doubleheader at Cleveland Wednesday the Yankees folded before the Tigers yesterday 6-3 while the Indians defeated the Boston Red Sox 5-1.

Gordon's Error Costly  
From New York's standpoint the most disheartening feature of the Yankees' second straight loss was that victory was so close. Although in hot water often, Donald was winning 3-2 going into the last half of the eighth. Then Joe Gordon threw a double play ball into the dugout and the Tigers rattled four unearned runs on four singles.

It was the 14th triumph of the year for Schoolboy Rowe, who only two years ago went back to the minors with a sore arm that few people thought would ever be cured. He gave 11 hits, two more than his mates made, but he was careful in the clutches and fanned six.

The Indians' massacre of the Red Sox came on spectacular three-hit hurling by the veteran Mel Harder and a ten-hit bombardment that was concentrated in the fourth inning when seven runs scored.

This left Cleveland half a game behind Detroit and 1 1/2 ahead of New York, but that wasn't all. It let the surprising Chicago White Sox catch up with Boston for a fourth place tie; six games back of the lead.

The Washington Senators squeaked the St. Louis Browns 7-2 with Rookie Arnold Anderson doing a six-hit mound chore.

Cincy Eliminates Giants  
Cincinnati eliminated the New York Giants mathematically from the pennant picture by pounding out a 3-1 decision for Gene Thompson's 15th victory of the year. Junior pitched shutout ball till the ninth.

The best National league fun, however, was in other games. For instance, Hugh Casey won both halves of a doubleheader for the Brooklyn Dodgers against the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-0 and 7-4. He went the route in the first game in a three-hit show and then went to the relief of Hamlin with the score tied in the seventh inning of the nightcap and got credit for the victory.

The once punchless Boston Bees shelved the St. Louis Cardinals 17-7 and 6-1, getting 36 hits in the doubleheader.

The Chicago Cubs piled up 14 hits, including Nicholson's 24th home run, to plug the Phils 5-1.

## Grid Call Brings 50 at Roseburg High

One of the largest squads in the history of Roseburg high school has turned to greet its new coach, Jim Davis, ex-Albany college athlete and former Reedport high school mentor, at the conclusion of the first week of practice. The squad, an even 50 in number, with the possibility of several additional names being added to the roster during the next week, is for the most part green material, but already productive of several prospects who will likely make themselves known before the end of the season.

This two-score-and-ten will prune itself down to about 35, a good workable squad, before the month is out, with most of those lost eliminating themselves by their own accord as the workouts get tougher and the play faster. The remainder will form the nucleus for the two elevens under the supervision of Davis and Jim Watts.

The large turnout is primarily the result of the announcement that the group would be divided into A and B squads with a regular schedule of games for each. Another important factor for the surprising number out is the fact that only two lettermen are returning from last year's squad, leaving the battle for positions a wide-open affair.

Most of the 50 are sophomores and juniors, and judging from the way some of these youngsters are developing, mighty few seniors will be on the starting eleven. Most of the third-year men have the edge in experience over their greener but more determined youngsters just up from junior high, but from the looks of things going on nightly at Finlay field, the seniors will have to demonstrate to Coach Davis that they are the best men on the squad in their respective positions in order to draw the starting nod.

Davis gave the squad its first formations which they will use throughout the season at last night's practice.
