BOSTON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The tone of the market has been somewhat improved this week as the mills have been in to take up some of their options covering against the government contracts on which bids were opened last week."

"Prices, however, have shown no material change, although generally firm. There is no civilian business yet worthy of the name to move prices higher, so that prices on goods for the government have been made at levels which show very little profit to the mills."

"Western operations have been rather negligible this week with growers holding firm for prices as high as last week or higher. Some small sales have been made, however, especially in the southwest."

"South American new clip wools for shipment in November-December are being offered at slightly above old clip prices, without takers."

"Mohair is quiet with prices unchanged."
