Of special interest to Douglas county residents, pioneers of this community and persons desiring to preserve historical facts regarding Roseburg, will be the special ceremony to be held at the Roseburg public library building at three o'clock the afternoon of September 29th, when local organizations will join together in placing a marker on the library building. This marker will commemorate the memory of President Hayes and his party visit to Roseburg sixty years ago.

Interest in the marker ceremony was first started here by Mrs. G. R. Child, prominent San Francisco resident and for a number of years one of Roseburg's most outstanding civic workers. A number of local organizations took up the project of contributing to the marker fund and will take part in the ceremony at the library building on Sunday, September 29. Mrs. George M. Brown and Miss Adeline Stewart have been acting as co-chairmen for the ceremony, to which the public has been cordially invited to attend.

Finis Dillard, one of the Roseburg's most prominent pioneers, was present the day that President Hayes and his party visited here at the late Judge Willis residence (now the library building). Mr. Dillard reports that the entire county's population came to Roseburg to celebrate the occasion. President Hayes' visit here sixty years ago is the only visit a president of the United States has ever been here overnight. Mrs. Belle Sherman and Miss Lulu Willis, daughters of the late Judge and Mrs. Willis, are residents of this city and the former was home at the time President Hayes visited overnight here.
