Newspaper Week Now On In Oregon

Governor Sprague's Statement Cites Service to Public, Courage of Editors.

Designating October 1 to 8 as "Newspaper week in Oregon," Governor Sprague issued the following statement:

"With a loyalty to community interests which is characteristic, newspapers have generously publicized weeks for virtually all commodities, groups and services."

"Now some Praelilla has suggested that newspapers 'speak for themselves' and a National Newspaper week is scheduled for October 1 to 8. Nowdays a person cannot go as long without the news as the camel without water. News is almost as indispensable for modern living as food and drink; and newspapers continue to be the principal medium for collecting and distributing the news as is proven by the steady growth in newspaper circulation."

"Newspapers are vital also in the field of editorial interpretation of news; and Oregon is famed for the ability and courage of its editorial writers."

"As commercial enterprises newspapers take rank among the important industries of the community. They provide steady employment for writers, office workers and skilled workers; and a very large proportion of their income is expended in the communities they serve."

Democratic Gains in Oregon House Forecast

EUGENE, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Monroe Sweetland, executive secretary of the Oregon Commonwealth federation, here today to board the special train carrying Henry A. Wallace to Portland, predicted democratic gains in the house of the state legislature after the fall election.

"A survey of Oregon legislative

changes by representatives of the Oregon Commonwealth federation this week reveals that republican aspirants for the house speakership may have their plans rudely upset by a democratic majority at Salem next January," he said in an interview. "Although the republicans stand to lose several senate seats, they will certainly retain their majority in that body. In the house, however, the odds at the present time are in favor of the democrats to occupy from 29 to 34 of the 60 seats."
