reach an agreement with China on ending their long war.

(A broadcast from Tokyo by Domei, Japanese news agency, quoted the authoritative Japan Times as describing Britain's decision as "an unmistakable indication that she is taking up with the United States a common front against this country.")

(Domei said it was not believed the Burma road decision would affect Britain's ban on the transportation of military supplies into China through British Hongkong.)

(Completed since the commencement of Chinese-Japanese hostilities in 1937, the road makes a tortuous, twisting 2,000-mile route connection Kiangsoo, in Burma, with Chungking, provisional capital in southwestern China.)

War's Toll Cited Churchill's war report made these other points, even while London's anti-aircraft guns rumbled faintly in the distance.

Hilber's month old air total warfare on London and Britain's other great cities is diminishing in force, although 8,500 people have been killed and 13,900 wounded since September 7 by an average of nearly 400 long-range bombers daily.

Disciplinary action has been taken against persons responsible for "errors" in the ill-fated Anglo-French expedition against Dakar, by which French warships were allowed to pass the straits of Gibraltar and defended the Senegalese colony.

In an expression of sentiment in behalf of the petition, all of the 75 or more school patrons present at the meeting except several of the Jehovah's Witness faith, rose to their feet. The latter also kept their seats on the call for negative sentiment. This action followed an announcement by Chairman Kruss that he would vote on the petition in accordance with the wishes of the majority of the school patrons.

The school has an enrollment reportedly of 19 pupils, six of whom are members of the families of the flag-salute opponents.

AMERICANS ADVISED TO LEAVE ASIAN PERIL SPOTS

SHANGHAI, Oct. 8.—United States consulates throughout the whole theater of the Chinese-Japanese war have been instructed by the state department to advise United States citizens to return home as soon as possible. It was reported authoritatively today.

This covered the whole Japanese empire, all of China, Manchukoo, Hongkong and French Indo-China.

Coming at a moment of sharpening tension between Japan and the United States and Japan and Britain, it meant that these zones in Asia were to be placed on the same basis as Europe in August, 1939, on the eve of the outbreak of the European war.

United States citizens in Europe who were urged to leave without delay.

The reported instructions from Washington follow within two weeks upon Japan's alliance with Germany and Italy in a three-power military pact generally regarded as aimed at the United States.

They also coincided with a report that the Japanese navy had landed forces on Liu Kung island, off Shantung peninsula, where the Chinese government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek recently renewed a British lease for 10 years.

Churchill disclosed that one British battleship and one heavy cruiser were damaged at Dakar; that two Vichy submarines were sunk, two destroyers fired, one cruiser hit and the crippled battleship Richelieu further damaged by the British.

He reaffirmed Britain's backing of the "free French" cause.

Again, the prime minister kept the British on the alert against invasion dangers, declaring that Germany was keeping several hundred short range dive bombers at home, perhaps "in reserve for a general plan of invasion."

Churchill conceded that the property damage from the German air raids had been severe, but he declared at the present rate of destruction it would take Hitler ten years to demolish half the homes of London and "quite a lot of things are going to happen to Hitler—before ten years."

As for Spain, Churchill said, she hovers between war and peace, but she needs peace and Britain hopes she will again "take her rightful place both as a great Mediterranean power and as a leading and famous power in the family of Europe and Christendom."

Model German Troops are About to Leave for Rumania

Model German troops are about to leave for Rumania, authorized sources said today, "to act both as a living example to the Rumanian army and to give the Rumanian people absolute assurance of the security at home and abroad which is necessary for reconstruction of this severely shattered state."

Authorized sources yesterday had said Germany had sent armed contingents "precautionarily" into Rumania and hinted that military protection of oil fields perhaps was the prime motive.

BERLIN ADMITS COSTLY BLOWS IN BRITISH RAID

BERLIN, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Night-light German bombing raids on southern England were reported today by the high command, which admitted that British bombers had inflicted casualties and military damage on Berlin in a fierce exchange of air blows.

Besides subjecting this capital to the worst raid it has yet suffered, British fliers struck also at Hamburg, Germany's chief port, and Amsterdam, chief city of the Nazi-occupied Netherlands.

At least 25 persons were killed and approximately 60 injured, German sources declared, and the toll may be considerably higher. More than half the dead, they said, were women and children.

Yesterday's fighting, swelling again to a thunderous crescendo after the week-end's weather-enforced lull, was said by the high command to have cost the British 32 planes shot down in airfighting over England against a loss of 33 German aircraft.

It reported two other British planes downed by anti-aircraft fire as they approached Berlin in raids which, it said, made the German capital the "main objective."

"Defense measures forced the majority to turn off," it said, "while part reached the city capital. Bombers again hit several hospitals, apartment houses and stores as well as railway tracks, causing property damage in some places."

There were no details of the attack on Hamburg beyond the barest announcement in Propaganda Minister Goebbels' newspaper Der Angriff that British warplanes had raided the North sea harbor as well as Berlin during the night.

Advices from Amsterdam said eight persons were killed there in the heaviest raid of the war so far on that city. Incendiary and explosive bombs caused much damage.

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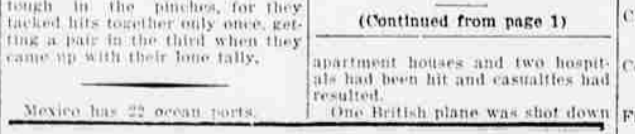
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
