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Gill to Aid in U. S. Crops Sale Set-Up

Announcement of the appointment of Ray W. Gill, Portland, master of the Oregon State grange, to head a surplus agricultural products marketing committee for Oregon, was made in the Oregon Grange Bulletin, official state grange publication, here today. The appointment was made by Clayton S. Wickard, secretary of agriculture, the report states.

Unable to go immediately to Washington, D. C., for a conference regarding his duties, Mr. Gill, the Grange Bulletin reports, has appointed Morton Tompkins, Dayton, state grange agricultural committee chairman, to attend the meeting as his representative. "Preliminary plans indicate that the committee will work directly with the state and regional officials of the surplus marketing co-operatives, food distributors and consumers in an orderly distribution of surplus fruit and truck crops to needy families and school children through a food stamp plan, commodity grants and a school lunch program." It is expected, the announcement says, the appointment of the full committee will be made within the next 30 days.

Turkey Growers Lose Money in Warm Spell

ALBANY, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Warm October weather is costing turkey growers money, they said today.

Birds otherwise in prime condition have not sprouted pinfeathers, a defense against cold weather. Consequently many turkeys going to market in the near future must be graded down.

Killing will start in four Albany plants late next week. County Agent F. C. Melton estimated the Linn county production at 200,000 birds, approximately 5 per cent below last year's level.
