

Six-Lane Defense Highway Planned

Washington - to - Baltimore Link Project: Boosts Hopes for Pacific Highway Work.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5. (Special to News-Review).—National defense highways competed with the election here today for front page space in Washington newspapers with the announcement that a new six-lane highway between Washington and Baltimore is under "final consideration" by the federal works administration as part of a national defense highway system to be recommended shortly to President Roosevelt.

Federal Works Administrator Carmody now is preparing final plans of the defense highway report and its submission to the president is imminent. Estimates of cost and other details will be made public by the white house upon submission to congress, it is reported. The same source says that most of the cost will be borne by the government under special defense appropriations. 75,000 miles of road under various classifications as to priority are said to be in the network drawn up by the army.

"The Oregon Pacific Highway association pioneered in the field of stressing the importance of highways in national defense," said Carl I. Peterson, manager of the association here today, "and naturally we are pleased that action is imminent since it should mean early improvement of the Pacific highway from Eugene to Grants Pass, one of the worst bottlenecks on an important road on the west coast, as well as other important Oregon roads."
