Washington Vote Goes to Roosevelt; Chadwick Losing

SEATTLE, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The Evergreen state remained in the democratic column today on returns for most major offices in yesterday's election, though republicans had hopes of capturing three of the six congressional seats, and Seattle's mayor, Arthur B. Langlie, was steadily cutting down the gubernatorial lead of C. C. Dill, democratic former U. S. senator from Spokane.

Election watchers forecast the state's 25,000 absentee ballots to be counted next week may determine several close results. Many of them were issued to national guardsmen now in training camp.

Incomplete, unofficial returns on the presidential vote from 1717 precincts of the state's 3,018 gave Roosevelt 228,749 and Willkie 151,957.

Rep. Moulton C. Wallgren of Everett, appeared at a virtual certainty to succeed U. S. Senator Lewis B. Schwelblich, who has been appointed a federal district judge.

Compilations of 1,745 of the state's 3,018 precincts gave Wallgren 214,501 to 171,956 for Stephen

P. Chadwick, Seattle, the republican nominee, a past national commander of the American Legion.

Dill, who trailed in initial counts last night, then exchanged the lead with Langlie half a dozen times until, near the 300,000-vote mark, he finally attained an 11,000-vote lead that margin rapidly diminished to 5,000 today on returns from his own eastern side of the mountains.

Congressman Warren G. Magnuson of the 1st (King-Kitsap) district, and John Coffey, Tacoma, in the 4th, appeared assured of reelection over the republicans' Fred Wetrick and Paul A. Press.

But GOP partisans still saw chances of upsetting democratic representatives Knute Hill, in the 4th; Martin F. Smith, 3rd, and Charles H. Leavy in the 6th.

Mr. Roosevelt never mentioned the third term issue in his brief campaign, but in his speech at Cleveland, Ohio last Saturday night he predicted that the nation would "reach the clear, sure footing ahead" in the next four years and that then "there will be another president in the White House."

And, as if to reply to the charges of dictator ambitions that his foes had raised against him, he continued by saying that there would be "many more presidents in the years to come, and I think that in those years to come that word 'president' will be a word to cheer the hearts of common men and women everywhere."

Before Mr. Roosevelt decided to carry the third term question to the electorate, Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Jackson, Grant, Cleveland, Wilson, Theodore Roosevelt and Coolidge have had the opportunity to consider testing the president.

In the Wake of the Voting

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The third term tradition, part and parcel of American political history for a century and a half, was swept aside yesterday in the apparent Roosevelt triumph.

It was the first clean-cut test of the old tradition. It was the first time the electorate had ever expressed itself directly on the subject. And the verdict rendered by millions of voters gave Franklin Delano Roosevelt an increasingly strong title to the distinction of being the first man ever elected to the presidency three times.

President Roosevelt was the eleventh chief executive in the nation's history to confront the third term problem. The issue played a major part in the heated campaign

waged against him. Throughout the weeks of electrifying numerous demands were heard for a constitutional limit on the number of years a chief executive may serve.

Whether Mr. Roosevelt's success at the polls would intensify or diminish the urgency of such demands was uncertain. The president, however, was given the nation his assurance that his third term—which he sought because of the "great storm raging" in the world—would be his last.
