

### Republicans Gain Four Senate Seats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP)—A resounding tide of midwestern votes will counter to the national campaign trend carried by the Republicans today to a six-year high point of 28 seats in the new Senate.

That meant four more places than they now hold but was far below the democratic total of 66. Party voting which cut through the Roosevelt majorities in Ohio, Illinois and Minnesota and paced the Willkie strength in Nebraska and Indiana, gave the Republicans five seats previously held by Democrats. The only offset to this was the Republicans' loss of a seat in Delaware.

The last race to be decided was in North Dakota, where Governor William Langer, who had been defeated by Langer in the republican primary, William Langer, Independent, finished second in the contest.

When Vice-President Garner or a substitute—bounced the gavel at the first meeting of the 77th Congress January 3, there will be more members on the republican side of the aisle than at any time since the 73rd Congress, in which 56 served, quit on June 18, 1934.

Henry Wallace, 52-year-old former secretary of agriculture, will as the new vice-president become presiding officer January 20 of a Senate which will be composed of 66 Democrats, 28 Republicans, 1 Progressive and 1 Independent. The present Senate included 69 Democrats, 24 Republicans, 1 Progressive, 1 Independent and 1 Farmer-laborite.

The lone progressive was Robert M. La Follette, who was re-elected Tuesday in the closest battle of his political career.

**New Senators Named**  
Of the 13 new senators, seven will be republican and six democratic.

Republicans who will take the oath for the first time include: Raymond E. Willis, Angola publisher who defeated Senator Sher-

### Arizona Rejects Bill To Legalize Gambling

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 6.—(AP)—An initiative measure proposing to legalize gambling in Arizona passed today to have been overwhelmingly rejected in yesterday's election.

Returns from 251 complete and 127 incomplete precincts out of 429 gave the measure 20,825 votes to 36,231 against it. It was trailing in every county.
