SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8. (AP)—The two undefeated football championship contenders of the far west square off tomorrow in the season's main event with the prospects that a Rose bowl ticket can be written on the outcome of the pugilistic classic.

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Mrs. F. R. Denies Getting Richer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, lecturer, broadcaster, author and columnist, cheerfully told her press conference today that while she had "made a great amount of money" she now had less principal than eight years ago.

The president's wife was asked whether, now that the election was over, she would discuss her income and outgo. She replied: "There seems to be an impression in the minds of certain people that I have made a great amount of money and laid it up. I have made a great amount of money but I have not one cent of principal nor have I put one cent in investment since 1932."

Much of the money that she had earned, she said, has gone into charities—some of it into wages and into business to help people start small enterprises. Asked whether she charged interest she laughingly said no.

Mrs. Roosevelt said she had the feeling that if she did make money while in the white house that it should be spent for constructive purposes. She added emphatically, "none of my family has profited by anything I've made." She said her charity donations exceeded the 15 per cent allowed by the federal income tax, and, further, that she paid income tax on all her earnings.
