Italians Get Ready to Quit Albanian Base

Army Trucks Stream From Key City of Koritza as Attack Of Greeks, British Drive Outposts Farther Back.
BITOLJA, Yugoslavia, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Italian army trucks, presumably carrying supplies, were seen leaving Koritza today as Greek heavy artillery and British planes bombarded the area and reports strengthened that the fascists were ready to abandon their vital Albanian base.

Douglas Tax Levy Will Be Decreased

C.) of the house ways and means committee said today federal expenditures for relief next year should be smaller and predicted there would be a new tax bill then to raise "at least" sufficient additional revenue to meet "normal expenses" of the government.

Imperialism to Vanish by 2040, U. S. Envoy Predicts

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 20.—(AP)—U. S. Ambassador Joseph Daniels predicted today "there will be no king or queen or emperor" holding power "by right of inheritance or life tenure" in 2040, nor any dictator seizing power by force or holding it by denial of the popular will.
