

Paris Resistance To Axis Induces U. S. Envoy Return

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Relations between the United States and France entered an apparently new phase today, coincident with the increasing reports that Marshal Petain was showing a disposition to go slow in collaborating with the axis powers.

The impression appeared to be growing here in government quarters that Petain personally was offering strong resistance to axis pressure on some points of vital concern to the United States, particularly the use of French naval bases in Africa and some of the French fleet.

Petain's protest over German expulsion of the French population from Lorraine was regarded here as a sign that the aged chief of state was drawing a line on the extent of collaboration with the axis.

More immediate diplomatic interest attached to the continued pressure in North Africa of general Maxime Weygand, former French generalissimo and commander of French forces in the near east.

He is reported to have resisted efforts of some French officials to induce him to return to France.
