Tentative Period
Set for Calling
Guard Remainder

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The war department announced today that remaining units of the national guard would be mobilized between January 6 and April 1, under a revised, tentative schedule involving delays ranging from one week to nearly two months.

Secretary Stimson said the delays beyond a tentative schedule projected in October involved approximately 96,000 men.

At his press conference, Stimson said that the delays were due to weather, labor difficulties, shortage of water, and other causes.

Stressing the fact that "we are building altogether to posts or camps," for the national guard, the secretary declared that "in general, it seems to me to have been a very creditable performance."

The secretary emphasized that the new induction dates were still tentative and were subject to possible additional delays, particularly on construction of camp facilities now scheduled for completion after February 1.

In response to a question, Stimson said he would not say off-hand whether the delay in mobilizing the guard would involve also a delay in inducting selective service trainees, a large portion of whom are to be trained by guardsmen.

The war department explained that factors governing the final dates for national guard mobilization would be adequacy of shelter and readiness of utilities and hospital facilities for the men.

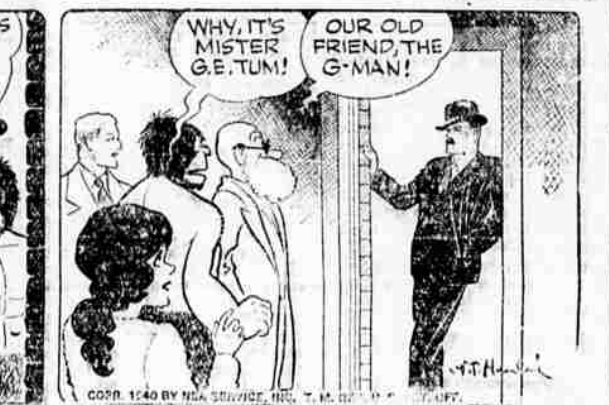

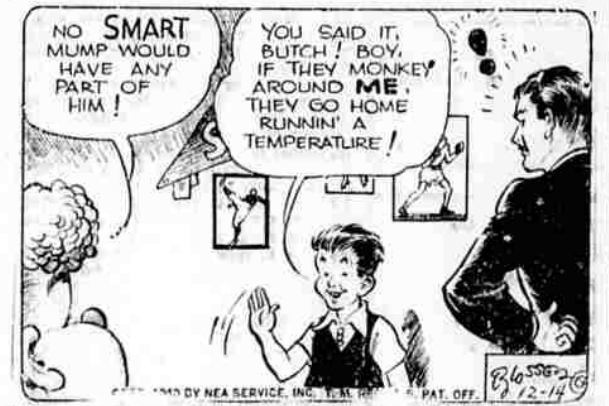
