Domestic Turkeys of U. S. Derived From Spanish Conquistador's Plan

 Because a conquistador of the name of Francisco Fernandez had a leaning toward animal husbandry, it being not uncommon even then for military men to dream of the time they could have poultry farms,

the world's largest turkey show is now open at Oakland in Oregon. To be sure, if Senor Fernandez hadn't shipped those tame Mexican turkeys back to Spain, somebody else would have done so very presently—but the historic fact is that Francisco was first.

Thus the Oakland turkey show, you may say, is in direct descent from the conquistador's project, even as the domestic turkey of our times is similarly derived. But it may be doubted, we say with warranted complacency, that the original turkeys of Yucatan were equal in excellence to those handsome birds that now are looking worried in the Oregon turkey center. It is our regional claim that these are veritably the world's finest turkeys, nor is this mere idle press agency. Francisco Fernandez was a smart don and a great credit to Philip II of Spain, for he foresaw all this, albeit dimly, four centuries and more ago. But it wasn't until the borrowed bird returned to the western world as we say, to town,

it ought to be a good turkey year for those that have turkeys. The blizzard that struck savagely at the middle west shortly before Thanksgiving day destroyed an estimated 4,000,000 birds. In Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota there were many growers who lost their flocks, and these of several thousand or more, to the last bird. Our Oregon turkey growers run no such gambit as this, for hereabouts the climate is kind to turkeys. If the poult can be reared beyond infancy, and the tricky time when wet feet may wipe out the hatches overnight, all is well with the flock. Every Oregon motorist has seen the visual evidences of an expanding industry, in the great flocks of turkeys that now are being reared annually where not long ago a few birds were the season's output.

Almost it is a major industry, and small wonder, Americans have ceased to think of the turkey as a bird traditionally reserved for two holidays, Thanksgiving and Christmas, and now consider it to be convenient for any season. And they are smoking it—an epicurean dream come true—and canning it also. In all likelihood the great turkey show now being held at Oakland is the forerunner of bigger and better shows to come.

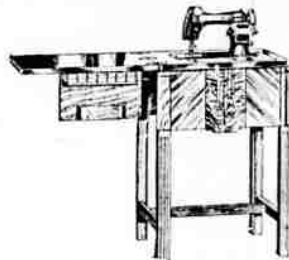
Owner of Grand Champion Tom Consistent Winner

A consistent winner at the North-western Turkey show for many years has been Albert D. Hudson, of Tangent, who this year exhibited the Narragansett tom, King Albert, I, chosen as the grand championship of exhibition birds.

Mr. Hudson has been an exhibitor at the Oakland show for 11 years. He started raising turkeys about 13 years ago and raises from 1,200 to 1,300 birds each year. He sells some birds on the market, but goes in principally for brooding stock, for which he finds ready sale.
