#### Strong Wins Breeder's Display

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#### Grand Champ Of Dressed Turkeys Labeled 'Perfect'

The grand champion turkey of the dressed show division at the Northwestern Turkey show was one of the most highly praised birds ever seen at Oakland, where the finest turkeys to be found in the world are shown each year.

"Undoubtedly there has never been a turkey exhibited to the public that was such a perfect specimen as this bird shown by George Bonebrake of Dixoville," M. H. Shook of Roseburg, principal judge in the dressed division, declared.

"This young tom," Mr. Shook said, "was perfectly proportioned. The fat was evenly distributed instead of being round in spots as is so often the case with toms. The bird was unusually broad of breast and back and was well fleshed throughout."

"There is no question in my mind," he said, "that it was the finest bird ever shown anywhere and anytime."

"Actually, the hams of that bird were so big," asserted E. B. McNaughton, Portland banker, speaking at the turkey show banquet, and with only slight exaggeration, that you could have cut round steaks for a whole family off of only one of them."
