**O. S. C. Hoopsters Trim Coloradoans**

DENVER, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A hot half rally gave the Oregon State Beavers a 33-31 victory over Colorado State in the final game of a triple header last night.

The Oregon quintet held the Colorado team to one field goal in the first 15 minutes of the second half. Jack Mulder, with eight points, and George McNeill, with seven, paced the Oregon State offense.

In other games of the evening Marshall of West Virginia defeated Colorado college 12-11 and Denver university defeated New Mexico 14-12.

The six teams will play triple-headers with different pairings tonight and tomorrow night. Oregon State rallied in the second half to overcome a Colorado State lead, and then utilized an air-tight defense to squeeze out the victory.

The Beavers trailed, 20 to 16, at the half, but flipped in accurate one-handed shots in the second period to pull ahead.

With 13 minutes to go, the Beavers held only a two-point lead, but they held onto the ball and snatched a victory.

**Oregon's Budget For Next 2 Fiscal Years Presented**

SALEM, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Oregon's balanced budget for the two years beginning next July 1 will total \$119,195,483, of which \$19,527,781 will be appropriated by the legislature and \$73,207,295 will be raised by special taxes, licenses and fees. Budget Director David Keeles said today.

The federal government also will contribute \$17,071,269, counties \$4,988,689. Endowments, gifts and bequests will total \$399,434 and repayment of loans by world war veterans will total \$1,100,000.

Amounts to be spent for the 14 state activities follow:  
Highways—\$71,975,000, of which \$28,309,000 will be raised by state gasoline taxes and license fees, and \$5,660,000 to be contributed by the federal government, and \$1,000 by the counties.

Public welfare—\$22,112,452, to be raised as follows: \$2,872,100 to be appropriated by the legislature, \$6,799,900 by state liquor revenues, \$7,742,973 by the federal government, and \$4,697,479 by the counties.

Liquor commission—\$14,724,923, but the total includes the \$12,469,470 wholesale value of the commission's liquor stocks. The entire amount comes from liquor taxes and sales.

Unemployment compensation commission—\$9,774,582, of which \$68,000 will be appropriated by the legislature, \$5,000,000 from payroll taxes, and \$4,706,582 from the federal government.

Industrial accident commission—\$9,512,126, all to be raised by fees charged employers and employees.

Education—\$8,965,285, with \$5,707,990 to be appropriated by the legislature, \$2,246,815 to be raised by special fees such as student tuition payments, \$560,114 by the federal government, and \$399,474 by endowments and gifts.

Development and conservation of natural resources—\$5,750,507, with \$1,955,265 to be appropriated by the legislature, \$2,497,931 from licenses and fees, \$1,919,929 from the federal government, and \$287,210 by the counties.

World war veterans state aid commission—\$5,021,729, of which \$896,787 will be appropriated by the legislature, \$24,942 from special fees, and \$1,100,000 to be collected from veterans who are repaying loans. This latter amount will be spent to retire part of the commission's debt.

Hospitals and institutions for handicapped persons—\$3,639,153, all to be appropriated by the legislature.

Protection of persons and property—\$3,118,875, of which \$1,383,621 will be appropriated by the legislature, and \$1,735,254 will be available from special fees, fines

and licenses.  
General government—\$2,068,750, with \$1,861,974 to be appropriated by the legislature, and \$1,296,776 to be raised from fees and licenses.  
Corrective institutions, including penitentiary and training schools—\$865,410, all to be appropriated by the legislature.  
Health and sanitation—\$570,655, with \$121,655 to be appropriated by the legislature, \$48,400 from fees, and \$380,600 from the federal government.  
Miscellaneous—\$59,824, including \$51,824 to be appropriated by the legislature, and \$5,000 to be raised from fees and licenses.
