The Gray Ladies were named by the patients themselves because of their gray uniforms, and the name proved so popular that the title has become the official name for the hospital and recreation corps of the Red Cross.

As their original name implies, the Gray Ladies were organized to provide recreation and perhaps little services for patients in hospitals. Although most hospitals admit there are various things a volunteer organization such as the Gray Ladies can do to help the personnel in their work such as letter writing, playing games, carrying on bedside occupational work and arranging dances.

For each year of fifty hours of service the Red Cross awards a Gray Lady with a bar for the sleeve of her uniform. Upon completion of fifty hours of service given for each of four fiscal years, she is awarded with a chevron.

The tea on Friday afternoon was held for the purpose of presenting the Gray Ladies with their bars and in the case of Mrs. Nancy Tandy, a chevron.

Before the awards were made, Mrs. Hatfield introduced Col. E. F. Tandy who gave an inspiring address to the Gray Ladies and invited guests. The audience was very interested to learn that there are eighty hospitals belonging to the veterans' administration throughout the country. These hospitals have a total of 7,000 patients with a bed capacity for 80,000. Col. Tandy pointed out that the veterans' administration is a unit in the national defense program, in case of a national emergency. Inasmuch as the Gray Ladies are a corps of the American Red Cross giving volunteer service to the veterans' administration, their work is of more than local importance. They are a trained, organized group ready to render service to their country in any emergency.

Dr. Arthur H. Mountford thanked the Gray Ladies for the work they have done in holding the medical staff in carrying out their recreational program for the patients. Dr. Mountford said the dances put on by the Gray Ladies were especially appreciated and hoped they would continue their good work.

Before presenting the Gray Ladies with their awards, Mrs. Hatfield complimented them on the fine work they have been doing. "These awards," she said, "cannot be bought. They have to be earned, and you ladies have worked hard to earn them."

Mrs. Nancy Tandy was then presented with the chevron representing four years of service and Mrs. Velle Broadway was awarded three bars for three years of service.

Mrs. Lois Baker, Mrs. Harriet Joesse, Mrs. Nellie McCullister, Mrs. Helen Mountford, Mrs. Sula Parkinson and Mrs. Donna Waddell were each awarded two bars representing two years of service.

Mrs. Jennie Whitton, Mrs. Amy Raish, Mrs. Beale Coleman, Mrs. Marie Martens and Mrs. Ida Reich were each presented with one bar for one year of service.

After the addresses and presentations, tea was served. The tea table was covered with a lovely lace cloth. Tall red candles in silver candleholders encircled by
