

Industry Will Do "Impossible," Says Assn. Executive

LANCSTER, Pa., Dec. 24.—(AP)—The "impossible" is the word used by the executive of the National Association of Manufacturers, declared last night in a radio address.

"Until the middle of December—less than two weeks ago—no one in industry had reason to believe that any one in government was dissatisfied with the rate of defense production—a rate, incidentally, that government itself had set."

"Suddenly overnight there was a shift in the defense picture. The word 'urgent' appeared."

"For the fact is that government, as represented by William S. Knudsen, production chief of the national defense commission, revealed at the annual meeting of the National Association of Manufacturers 10 days ago that the rate of defense production was not satisfactory."

Knudsen, Prentiss said, had asked industry "to do what was frankly termed 'the impossible.'"

"And let me add," the industrialist declared, "that it will do the impossible."

Concerning a lengthened work-week, Prentiss said that only labor could determine the contribution it wanted to make, adding:

"Labor has spoken bravely and encouragingly," through William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, who pledged his organization to the avoidance of strikes during the emergency."

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Lindbergh O. K.'s White's Stand On Defense of U. S.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—(AP)—A statement by William Allen White setting forth his position as chairman of the committee to defend America by Aiding the Allies brought an expression of commendation from Col. Charles A. Lindbergh today and an assertion by Verne Marshall that it was in "direct contradiction" to some of White's previously expressed views.

White, Kansas newspaper editor, said yesterday that his only reason for being a member of the committee was "to keep this country out of war."

Marshall, chairman of the no foreign war committee and an Iowa newspaper editor, replied he had heard White say in an address at the Union League club last month that "it is time for us to take sides in this war."

Colonel Lindbergh, in a statement to the New York World-Telegram today, said that "Mr. White has rendered a great service to this country by clarifying his position and the position of his committee. He has given us new hope for a united America at a time in our history when unity is essential."

White's statement was made to Roy W. Hoard, editor of the New York World-Telegram, in response to a request for clarification of his position.

"Many of us have felt in the past that Mr. White's committee was intentionally leading us to war," Lindbergh said. "We know that certain supporters of the committee have discussed what steps 'short of war' would lead to war most quickly."

"Mr. White has now clarified this situation," Lindbergh added. "The 'Nopar' carries a crew of 23. He tells us that the committee as men."

Marshall, however, took issue with White and said that "if Mr. White's committee, in truth, has no war aims, why does it persistently and stubbornly undertake to lead the Washington administration, or force it, into defiant violation of the Johnson act and the neutrality law?"

War May Change Farm Benefits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(AP)

Predictions that the war and shrinking foreign markets would force congress to make major changes in farm benefits came today from Chairman Fulmer (D., S. C.) and Representative Hope (R., Kans.) of the house agriculture committee.

They said in interviews that continually increasing surpluses and rising wages for industry would compel a compensating adjustment for the producers of all crops, particularly those exported.

"We've got to do something to get away from these annual appropriations for parity and give the farmer some base for his income, such as the certificate plan," Fulmer said.

"I intend to put the whole problem before the committee as soon as possible after the new congress convenes and hope that we solve it."

"The certificate plan seems to be the best plan that has been offered," he continued. "That would give the farmer a basic price and at the same time would permit surpluses to move into whatever markets we have."

The income certificate plan is a modification of the AAA processing tax which the supreme court invalidated. Farmers who co-operated with federal crop programs would be given certificates for the percentage of their crops expected to be consumed domestically. The value of the documents would be fixed by the secretary of agriculture.

Then a purchaser of the raw farm commodity would be required to pay the current market price, plus the certificate value. This added cost presumably would be passed on to the consumer, as was the processing tax.
