Draftee Signs Up But Adds Protest

DALLAS, Ore., Dec. 31.—(AP)—Howard W. Stone of Monmouth registered for the military draft yesterday, but added a written protest declaring that the draft was an "unmistakable violation of the letter in spirit of the U. S. constitution."

His suit challenging the constitutionality of the selective service law was dismissed last week by Federal Judge Pease. Stone previously charged that if he registered, it would be in violation of the law. He took as a census enumerator to uphold the constitution. In his statement yesterday, he said that since the federal court had upheld the constitutionality of the law he now had "judicial sanction for registering without violation of my oath."

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
