Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Jenks and son, Pat, from Klamath Falls visited relatives here several days last week.

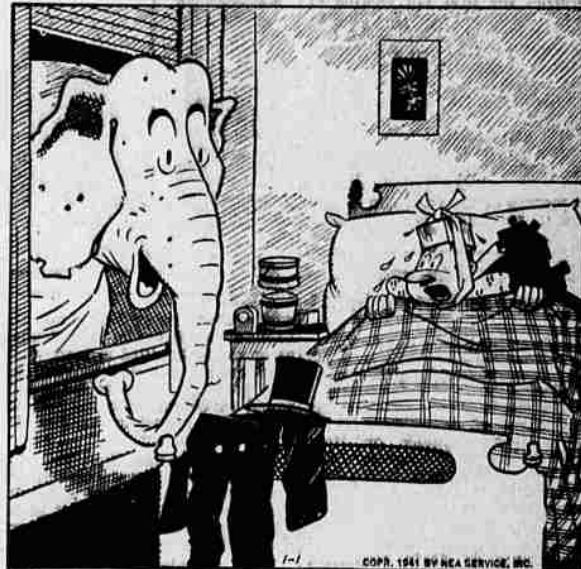
