

Last Survivor of Two Applegate Families Dies

MEDFORD, Jan. 1.—Funeral services were held Tuesday for Mrs. Rachel Lindsay Alford, 83, a native daughter of Oregon. Death was due to a paralytic stroke last December 7.

Mrs. Alford was the youngest and last survivor of the families of the Applegate brothers, Lindsay, Jesse and Charles, who came to Oregon from Missouri in 1843. The three families numbered 36 children.

She was the daughter of Lindsay Applegate and born at Yoncalla, Douglas county, December 26, 1857. Three years later the family moved to Ashland, where Mrs. Alford obtained her education in the public schools and the old Ashland academy. In 1880 she was married to Mose L. Alford, member of a pioneer family who came to Oregon in 1850, settling in Linn county, where he was born.

She is survived by her widower, Mose L. Alford, city recorder of Medford, and a son, Herbert L. Alford, also of Medford.

CRISTOBAL, C. Z., Dec. 31.—(AP)—Employees of the German-owned Hamburg-American line today tore down, stamped and spat upon the red ensign of the British merchant fleet which had been hoisted over their office in the night by pranksters.

A noisy crowd, attracted by the appearance of the "red duster" over the Nazi premises, witnessed the incident. After ripping down the ensign the Germans hastily withdrew inside the building.
