LONDON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—General Jan Christian Smuts, prime minister of the Union of South Africa, in a New Year message to the world published today in London, predicted United States intervention in the war and said it was "necessary for victory." "Deeply as America desires to keep out of this war, they will find the necessity laid upon them and in the last resort they will not let freedom perish from the earth," said Smuts, soldier veteran of the world war. "I feel assured that American intervention is necessary for victory and for the peace which has to be shaped thereafter."
