Next to defense, the auxiliary places in importance the need for governmental protection for widows and orphans. The senate finance committee is still studying the bill.

Much legislation is also needed on civil service. The Legion program envisions elimination of the present requirement of "relative need" in the works progress administration.

Three major points in the American efforts are those dealing with immigration, increased personnel for the federal bureau of investigation and continuation of the Dies committee.

Women of the auxiliary are faced with the greatest task in the history of the organization. What is ahead for America we do not know, but ours is the obligation to help our nation to steady ground, steady nerves, steady confidence. . . . we trust we will not need steady trigger fingers.

Delegates from all over the country will meet for the sixteenth women's patriotic conference on national defense in Washington, D. C. on January 27. Mrs. William Horstfall of Marshfield will
