

3-Minute Play By M'Nutt Wins For OSC Basketeers

CORVALLIS, Jan. 8.—(AP)—A "pressure player" whose name was conspicuously absent from pre-season publicity showed Oregon State the way to a 45 to 39 victory over Washington State in the Northern Division Basketball conference opener last night.

Forward George McNutt, who transferred to Oregon State from Pasadena Junior college this year, rallied the northern division's defending champions from the edge of defeat with a magnificent performance in the waning minutes of a wild game.

Behind 17-20 at halftime and minus the services of their high-scoring center, John Mandie, who went out on personal furlough in the initial session, the Beavers appeared stamped for defeat as the second half got under way.

Forward Dale Gentry increased the Cougars' halftime lead to five points with a field goal just after the start of the final half. But then the Beavers began coming to life and several times moved to within a point of the lads from the inland empire.

Finally, with only seven minutes remaining, Center Don Hall knotted the count at 33-33 with a field goal. A few seconds later Guard Paul Valenti put Oregon State in front for the first time in the second half. But it was not for long as Guard Kirk Gebert tied it at 35-35.

The count was tied twice more at 37-37 and 39-39 before McNutt took over with three minutes to play.

As both teams showed the effects of the wild, running game, McNutt fired in three field goals in rapid succession to rescue his teammates and grab a victory from Washington State's grasp.

The teams meet again tonight.

Wanda Parker returned Tuesday evening to Corvallis to resume her studies at O.S.C. She assisted in the local drug store during the holidays.

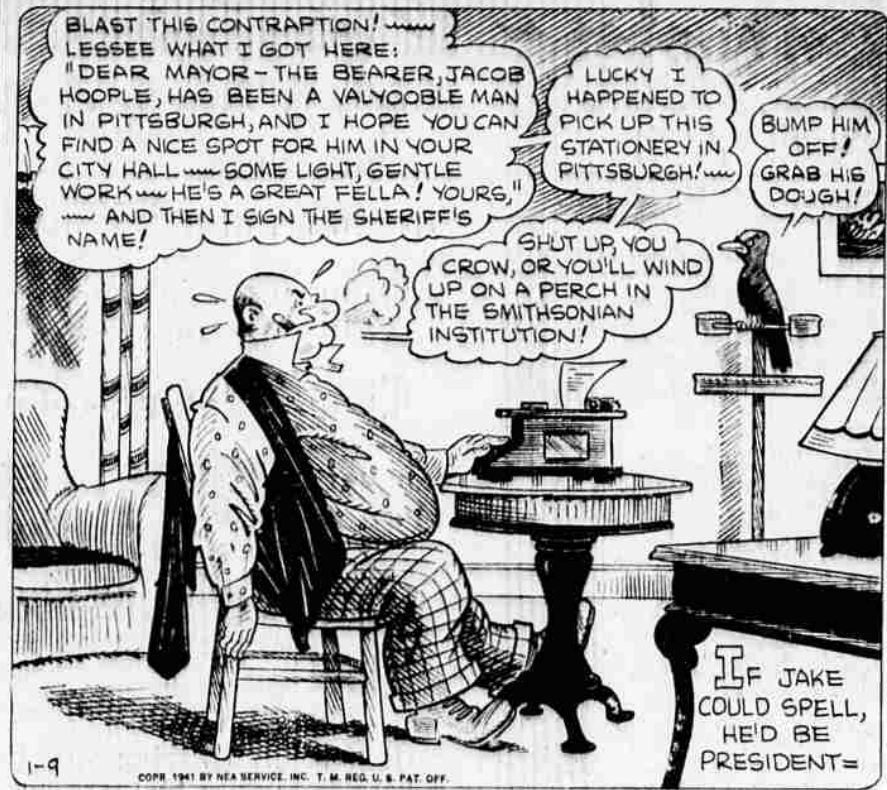
