San Francisco for deportation, Bonham said, tore away from guards and leaped through the window. The train's engineer later said it was going 67 miles an hour at the time.

"The train finally was stopped two miles from where he made the jump," Bonham said. "Immigration guards started back expecting to find him dead, and were they started when they saw him walking along the tracks with no shoes! The force of the fall tore his shoes off."

A physician later said he suffered only minor cuts and bruises.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The distinguished flying cross has been awarded to Second Lieutenant Willard W. Lazarus and Sergeant Thomas F. O'Malley, the war department announced today, for their coolness and courage in an emergency during a flight from San Juan, Puerto Rico, to the Virgin Islands last March 5.

While their plane was flying 2,500 feet above sea level both engines stopped suddenly and Lazarus ordered his passengers—four officers inexperienced in flying—and his crew chief, O'Malley, to descend by parachute while he maneuvered the plane to facilitate their jumps. He landed the plane with slight damage.

Instead of jumping himself, O'Malley remained in the plane and helped the passengers out and with the landing.

Lazarus, born in Kansas City, was a resident of Corvallis, Ore., when he entered the army and is stationed at San Juan.
