Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

OFFICIAL census figures released from census headquarters in Washington, D. C., yesterday reveal a slightly greater increase in Roseburg population for the 1930-1940 period than was indicated by the preliminary figures.

It is heartening to note that our population increase was decidedly better than the average increase in cities in the state. The average city increase was but 8.6 per cent.

At least, insofar as census figures are concerned, it is regrettable that some of the areas joining our city limits were not previously incorporated within the city. Although precinct figures are not yet available, it is a safe guess that the rate of increase in the adjacent districts was greater than in the city proper.

The total population gain for Douglas county was 3,763—or a gain of 17 per cent. This gain rate is substantially higher than the state average of 14.2 and indicates a very healthy trend. Seven of the state's 36 counties lost in population. Only four, Malheur, Crook, Lincoln and Josephine, enjoyed spectacular growth.

Some folks might argue that a gain in population is not necessarily desirable. With that we cannot agree. The state of Oregon, and especially southern Oregon, is not yet more than fractionally developed. There is room in this vast area south of Lane county to the California line for thousands upon thousands of additional population.

Copco Operation Facts Related Here By Its President

Facts and figures concerning the operation of the California Oregon Power company were told members of the Roseburg Rotary club and their guests yesterday in a revealing address by H. C. Cleland, president of the company.

Declaring that the members of the average household spend more in beauty shops than with the power company for electric service, Mr. Cleland displayed a "pie" chart showing the distribution of the average consumer dollar.

The Copco president outlined in detail the income and expense figures of his company indicating the amounts applicable to the Douglas county district. During 1940, he stated, \$189,000 was spent on new construction in this county, \$31,000 for property taxes and \$179,390 in payroll.

The speaker said his company employs 853 people, 102 of them being located in the Douglas county district. Located in this area also, he stated, are 322 owners of preferred stock in the company.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. (AP)—Legislation to reapportion the house of representatives with an increase of fifteen members under the 1940 census was proposed by Representative Rankin (D, Miss.).

The increased membership, from 435 to 450 would be effective with the 78th congress, convening in January, 1942. Under Rankin's bill, California would pick up three seats and the following states one each: Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin. Kansas and Oklahoma would lose one seat each. Other states would remain as at present.

legislature would shorten the commercial fishing season in Oregon's coastal streams.

It also would levy a \$50 fee on fishermen seeking a second license to legally fish on any river other than the one specified in the first license. Chairman John C. Veatch said this proposal was aimed at "barnstorming fishing crews."

Another proposal would raise the current tax of one-tenth cent to one-fifth cent a pound on smelt and restore the original charge of one-half cent a pound on all chinook salmon taken from Aug. 11-Oct. 1.
