Mr. and Mrs. A. Eckhardt, recent arrivals here from San Francisco, yesterday completed negotiations for the purchase of the James Howard property on the Doerner road near Melrose and are taking immediate possession. The transaction was conducted through the Fred A. Goff real estate agency.

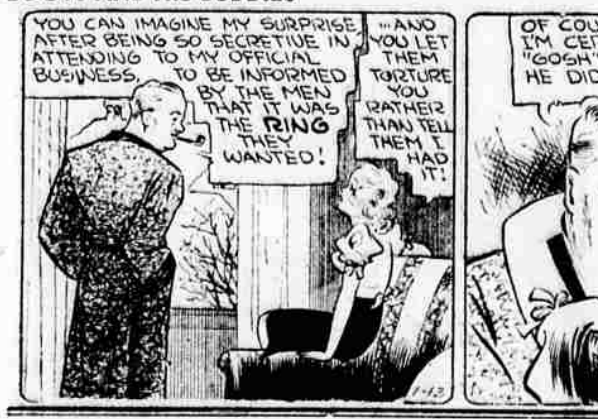
