Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent.

TODAY, for the 41st time in the history of our great state, a legislature will begin its session. A total of 40 days (and forty nights) is the allotted time in which it is supposed to do its work.

There seems to be more than the usual amount of heavy legislative work in the offing. Usually the file of bills from both houses runs to an impressive thickness with the various proposals for new laws totaling several hundred.

For one, the task of dividing the area of the state into four congressional districts, a d d n g one to the three we now have, is a fine problem. Of course, the legislature could side-step the issue developed by the fact that a census increase gives us the right to one more representative in congress.

Representatives in the national congress are generally chosen by districts. Thus each and every section of the whole country has its representation in the deliberations of congress.

So far as the southern portion of the state is concerned the district suggested by the legislative interim committee appointed to study the matter seems satisfactory. There has been no resident of southern Oregon sent to congress in more than 30 years.

The suggestion made by the interim committee was that the new district should take some counties from the large first district, and some from the vast area of the second district (east of the mountains).

The present unemployment insurance law is due to get some sort of over-hauling. It is reported that labor groups will endeavor to have benefit provisions broadened. More conservative elements will strive to have some of the "bugs" stricken out of the law.

As now operated, the unemployment insurance plan is be-

ing abused notably in that benefits are paid for voluntary unemployment as well as for unemployment resulting from causes beyond the control of the worker. Merit rating, that is a reward for good employers by giving them a lower rate, will be sought.

There will, as usual, be some fish legislation. Conservationists will endeavor to secure passage of a measure which will slightly reduce the net fishing season in the coastal streams, and ban the use of the deadly set-nets in most of them.

It is true now, as it always has been, that you can't have your cake and eat it, too.

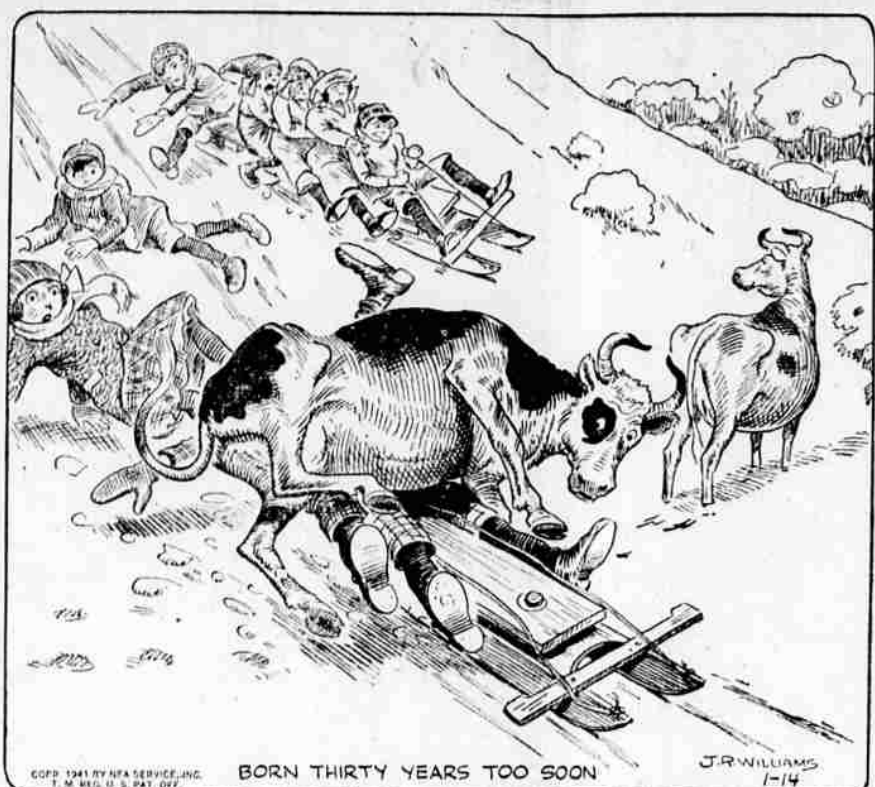
State Press Comment
