Greeks HARRY ITALIANS. On the Albanian battlefield, picked Greek shock troops were reported being rushed through the gap torn in the Italian lines at Kilsura in an effort to keep the fascist forces from making a new stand.

The Greeks said Italian resistance was greatly weakened and that the character of the terrain between Kilsura and Berat, in the Albanian oil fields, offered few natural barriers to their advance.

A Greek communique reported the capture of additional Italian prisoners and four tanks, but did not identify the sector where this success was scored.

Tobruk K. O. News. While the British army of the Nile continued to mass its strength around the beleaguered Libyan port of Tobruk, British sources in London expressed belief General Wavell had his plans nearly ready to try to administer a knockout blow to the Italians in East Africa.

The British Press association said an Italian defeat in east Africa seemed so probable the government was ready to grant not only safe conduct but "facilities" for removal of women and children from Italian colonies there.

Destruction of nine airplanes believed to be German Junkers 87's in a heavy raid Sunday night on Catania, Sicily, was reported today by RAF headquarters at Cairo.

Catania is on the east coast of the Italian island of Sicily and near the Strait of Sicily where, according to the Italian high command, German dive bombers have joined with the fascist air force in an offensive against British Mediterranean sea-power.

Junkers 87's are two-seater dive-bombers. The communique said three hangars were set on fire, one of them being demolished in a heavy raid the night of Jan. 14. The British also reported today that the Italian blackshirt General Argento had been captured by a motorboat crew after he had been spotted from the air "hiding by the water's edge" in north Africa.

Argento was said to have been commander of Italian forces at Sidi Barrani, recaptured Egyptian town which was the main advance base for Marshal Graziani's smashed offensive.

Bulgaria Issues Denial. Reports that units of Hitler's far-riding armies have already marched into Bulgaria—likely springboard for an attack on Greece or Turkey—elicited an official denial by the Sofia government.

No foreign troops, it was said, have entered Bulgaria nor has the government made representations to any foreign power regarding such a possibility.

Previously, unofficial reports said Bulgaria had called on her friend, Soviet Russia, for protection against a Nazi thrust.

In Ankara, Turkey, staff officers of the British middle east command were on hand for a two-day conference with Turkish military leaders.

The Uruguayan foreign minister, meanwhile, launched an investigation to determine whether a British war vessel had violated his country's territorial waters in twice turning back the French freighter Mendoza, which had attempted to run the blockade with food for France.

The Mendoza was driven back to Montevideo Sunday night by the British auxiliary cruiser Astoria, and was reported to have put back again last night after encountering the same vessel.

Another French merchant vessel was loading at Buenos Aires meanwhile, and three others were awaiting their turn.

C.I.O. Strike Spreads To Five Eaton Co. Plants

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but none of the day shift entered the plant. The Detroit unit employing 600 closed yesterday and was picketed today.

At Cleveland, the company decided not to operate its 450-employee stamping plant after a picket line formed.

All except the Saginaw plant have bargaining contracts with the UAW-CIO, while the Wilcox-Rich division management has a contract with the United Auto. Mobile Workers (AFL).

Governor Calls Parley Gov. Murray D. Van Wagner of Michigan said he had arranged a conference today with Irvin Carey, president of the UAW-AFL, and that he hoped to confer later with R. J. Thomas, UAW-CIO international president.

The UAW-CIO called the Saginaw strike yesterday morning, charging that the company violated a pledge to rehire 369 union members involved in a strike two months ago.

J. O. Eaton, company chairman, said the dispute was "strictly between different groups of employees" at the Saginaw plant.

Throughout the night strike leaders and company officials held frequent telephone conversations with the Washington office of Sidney Hillman of the national defense commission.

Twenty-seven persons, including 25 men and two women, remained in custody overnight for questioning by state police and Saginaw County Prosecutor Joseph Frisk, as the result of Monday's fighting.

and to keep British aid separate from "our own defense," instead of linking them in the legislation.

The Ohioan's announcement to newsmen that he would devote his efforts to getting the bill killed apparently put him on the side of Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.) and those others who have indicated that, regardless of modifications, only the defeat of the administration plan would satisfy them.

The substitute loan program which Taft advanced would become operative when British assets were exhausted and would be limited in the first instance to \$1,000,000,000 or \$1,500,000,000. Taft said commerce department reports showed that Britain still had \$4,000,000,000 of cash and marketable securities in the United States.

ed States. If the first \$1,500,000,000 loan proved insufficient for British, he added, congress could grant further sums.

and high success in his office" was introduced by eight house democrats, including Richard Neuberger and Phil Brady of Multnomah county, and two republicans, Angus Gibson and Truman A. Chase of Lane county.

Speed Limit Sought The state highway commission said today it would not introduce any legislation to adopt fixed highway speed limits. Such a

measure was introduced yesterday by Senators Lee of Multnomah county, McKay of Marion, and Clark of Douglas. The measure, drafted with the assistance of the commission, will not be either supported or opposed by it. It would establish limits of 15 miles an hour in school zones, 20 in business districts, 25 in residence districts, and 45 on open highways. It also would shift the

burden of proof from the officer to the driver, who would have to prove he was driving safely if found to be exceeding the speed limit. A state speed control board—the secretary of state, highway commission chairman and the superintendent of state police—could increase or decrease the limits on open highways. Cities and towns would have the same right on their streets and roads.
