OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 15.—John Charles Bursik, senior in agriculture from Roseburg, made the honor roll here for the fall term. Registrar E. B. Lemon has reported. The roll includes only those students who make grade point averages of 3.50 or better while carrying 12 or more credits.

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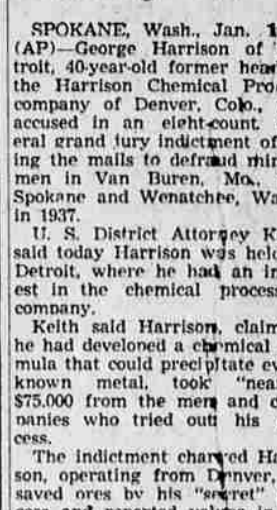
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Chemist Accused Of Mining Fraud



SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 16.—(AP)—George Harrison of Detroit, 40-year-old former head of the Harrison Chemical Process company of Denver, Colo., was accused in an eight-count federal grand jury indictment of using the mails to defraud mining men in Van Buren, Mo., and Spokane and Wenatchee, Wash., in 1937.

U. S. District Attorney Keith said today Harrison was held in Detroit, where he had an interest in the chemical processing company.

Keith said Harrison, claiming he had developed a chemical formula that could precipitate every known metal, took "nearly" \$75,000 from the men and companies who tried out his process.

The indictment charged Harrison, operating from Denver, assayed ores by his "secret" process and reported values in excess of true values. He charged also he sold \$5,000 licenses for the exclusive use of his process.

Keith said Harrison went through bankruptcy in Denver in 1938 and did not list his process as an asset.

Hoover Asks That Aid Bill Define Roosevelt Powers

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover called today on the house foreign affairs committee to draft immediately into the proposed aid-to-Britain bill positive definitions of the powers to be given President Roosevelt.

In a letter to Committee Chairman Sol Bloom (D., N. Y.), who said Tuesday the committee would be glad to hear all opponents and supporters of the measure, Hoover said:

"There is unfortunately growing up in the country a bitterness of discussion which it seems to me in the interest of national unity could be allayed by the committee. This division lies largely in the interpretations and implications in respect to the powers proposed to be conferred in this bill and its meaning."

Hoover asserted that he favored extending "every practicable aid, short of war, to Britain" but that he did "not approve of our joining in the war."
