

Armstrong, Zivic Clash Tonight in Their Second Bout

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The largest crowd of the indoor fight season is expected to watch Henry Armstrong try to take his welterweight title back from Fritz Zivic tonight in Madison Square garden.

This will be Henry's first scrap since he went down to unexpected defeat by Zivic last October, and it is tonight or never for the busy little negro who not so long ago held three championships simultaneously. If Zivic trounces him again, then it's adios to one of the greatest of modern fighting men.

So much, at least, has been gathered from Henry's conversation. He has plenty of money for a fellow of simple tastes, accumulated in as furious and as crowd-pleasing a career as any fighter ever lived through. Henry, however, would like to retire

with one title. It is a sort of monument that all fighters aspire to. Though Armstrong probably will go into tonight's 15-rounder a slight favorite in the wagering, he is by no means an overwhelming choice of those who qualify as experts.

There's a wide diversity of opinion because no one knows how near Armstrong comes to being the superb little savage he was a year ago. Henry has gone over the hill, but how far?

In their other fight Armstrong played out in the closing rounds and Zivic gave him a bad beating. At the final bell Henry was on the floor, exhausted and nearly blinded.

Since then Armstrong has undergone an operation to remove the scar tissue around his eyes. He has rested longer than ever before and devoted himself to building back his resources. He believes he has succeeded.

questioned concerning the newspaper story.

He said, in reply, he supposed congress might authorize him to acquire the German navy, too, and asked whether newsmen did not think the discussion was awfully awfully cow-jump-over-the-moon business.

President Uses Sarcasm
At first he misinterpreted the inquiry to understand the press was asking for comment on the possibility of disposing of the United States navy to Britain.

Talking on that matter, he remarked somewhat sarcastically that nothing in the bill would prohibit his doing what might be a dangerous thing—standing on his head. But he added with a chuckle that the president of the United States does not expect to stand on his head, has no desire to do so and similarly has no desire to get rid of the navy.

He was asked whether, since he did not intend to make any transfer of the fleet, he would have any objections to a restriction in the measure on such a transfer.

Sarcastically, the chief executive said he supposed we had better put in also a prohibition on his standing on his head.

Stories Brushed Aside
Mr. Roosevelt threw back his head and laughed uproariously when someone inquired whether he had discussed the legislation with Archbishop Amleto Cicognani, the apostolic delegate from the vatican, who called upon him earlier in the week. He shook his head in the negative.

He dismissed as just an Italian newspaper report a question about a story that said army and navy chiefs had advised him his policy of aid to Britain was wrong.

And he brushed aside as a Japanese newspaper report suggestions emanating from Japan that the United States Pacific fleet be recalled from Hawaii.

More Vessels Asked
President Roosevelt yesterday put in his formal request to congress for authority to build a fleet of 200 merchant vessels "upon an emergency basis," and asked for an appropriation of \$313,500,000.

The chief executive already had disclosed at a press conference that the program was in the making.

The program would be in charge of the maritime commission, which has estimated its cost at \$350,000,000. Mr. Roosevelt sent along with his message a joint resolution proposing the appropriation of \$313,500,000. He explained that the balance of the \$353,000,000 would be made up from \$500,000 which he already has allocated from an emergency fund placed at his disposal by congress, plus \$36,000,000 which he said would be available on July 1, 1941.

Rep. Kenneth S. Martin (R., Josephine), introduced a bill to appropriate \$1,000 to the game commission for installation of experimental fish screens in Josephine county.

Martin said the bill, providing for screen installation in ditches or streams of the first 20 persons who apply to the game commission, is designed to work out a

practical screening device which would operate without frequent inspection.

Ten-day angling licenses would be sold for \$2.50 instead of the present two-day week-end licenses which cost \$2 by terms of a bill ready for introduction in the house Monday.

The bill is sponsored by Rep. Kenneth S. Martin (R., Josephine), who also is sponsor of an alternative bill to limit the provision to Josephine, Jackson, Douglas and Curry counties.

A bill to license collection agencies and put them under more definite control of the state real estate commissioner than at present was in the house legislation and rules committee today for introduction Monday. The measure, introduced by Rep. Alan G. Carson (R., Marion), was requested by the state real estate commissioner.

The bill provides that agencies should account monthly for funds collected.

comes troops and equipment must be rushed to the invasion point from all such concentrations. But to do so now they would have to traverse some three hundred miles of mountainous area over roads built on a standard of width, grade and curvature that was in vogue 25 years ago. The fact is U. S. 99, known as the Pacific highway and duly designated as the principal north and south defense route west of the Cascades, is perhaps the most obsolete main highway in the nation. There can be no adequate defense of the Pacific coast until this condition is corrected.

We appeal to you, the members of the 77th congress, therefore to take steps at once to provide, out of defense funds, an adequate system of military highways for the nation. We mention the Pacific highway because we know of that problem—there may be others as bad. Our appeal is that transportation is an integral part of any military problem and that highways are the first essential, nowadays, in military operations.

When the present defense plans are completed we will have men, cannon, tanks, trucks and machine guns; but until we can move them quickly to where they may be needed we will not have national defense. We appeal to you to supply the missing link in the defense chain—adequate defense highways.

Heavy Blows Dealt in Three Sectors of War

at Catania, Sicily, in which grounded nazi planes were blown to bits and fires set which were visible 50 miles away.

Hitler's high command reported their efforts to sink the British aircraft carrier Illustrious, already crippled in a furious attack off Sicily January 10, striking at the 23,000-ton vessel as it awaited repairs at the port of Valetta, Malta.

The nazi high command said "several direct hits" were scored on the Illustrious, and informed German quarters declared the craft was now so badly damaged she would probably be knocked out of the war.

"Furthermore, numerous bombs struck the Malta arsenal," a nazi communiqué said, "and a merchantman was struck directly by the heaviest calibre bombs."

Greeks Still "Gaining"
Greek dispatches from the Albanian front reported new gains in the bitterly contested Tepeleni mountain sector, while the Greek press declared one-third of Italy's forces have been knocked out of the 11-week-old conflict.

Italian losses in the campaign were estimated at 70,000 killed, wounded, taken prisoner or sent back to Italy for frost-bite treatment.

During the night, distress signals crackled out of the North Atlantic from two large British ships—the 14,935-ton passenger liner Alameda Star and the 10,578-ton freighter Zealandia.

The "SSS" signal from both ships—meaning "attacked by submarine"—came from the same general zone northwest of Londonderry, Ireland, prompting speculation that the Germans may have sent out a new series of U-boats big enough to stand the buffeting of winter storms at sea.

Later messages from the two ships reported that each had been torpedoed, but it was not immediately known whether they had sunk. The Alameda Star had previously been classified by Germany as a "pirate ship" to be sunk without warning because she allegedly carried arms.

British forces encircling the Italian garrison at Tobruk, Libya, continued their preparations for an assault.

Japanese Press Bitter
Japanese reaction to the United States' attitude in the far east was reflected in violent anti-American comment in the press

as high military and cabinet officials held a conference with Premier Konoye.

It was the third such conference this week and foreign observers expressed belief it heralded closer cooperation between the cabinet and army and navy chiefs.

The jittery Balkans were kept in a state of anxiety by reports of repeated clashes at the soviet Russian-Rumanian frontier and by reports from diplomatic quarters that Adolf Hitler intends to take over Rumania and make it a German protectorate.

The word "Yankee" has been traced to Indian attempts to pronounce "Anglais," the French settlers' name for their English rivals.

French Sink Siam Boats
Far on the other side of the world, the undeclared war between French Indo-China and Thailand (Siam) flared to larger proportions.

The small French Asiatic fleet was reported to have sunk two Siamese warships and severely damaged a third in the Gulf of Siam. The size of the ships was not given.

Simultaneously, the Bangkok (Siamese) radio reported large-scale offensives were being pushed by the Siamese army in five sectors along the 1,000-mile frontier between the two countries.
